TEXAS AND FLORIDA

- Requires social media companies to host lawful but awful
 content such as child-grooming, terrorist recruitment, and animal
 abuse.
- Internet platforms have a First Amendment right to curate content and decide whether to host specific instances of speech as they see fit.
- Empowers the government to police and control speech online, overriding the First Amendment rights of online businesses.
- Tramples the First Amendment by allowing the government to force private businesses to host speech they don't want to.
- Discriminates against specific speakers by only targeting businesses over a certain size.
- The Act will fail under any level of First Amendment analysis as it is not narrowly tailored to a compelling government interest.



MISSOURI V BIDEN

- President Joe Biden and his administration were
- "working with social media giants such as Meta, Twitter, and YouTube to censor and suppress free speech, including truthful information, related to COVID-19, election integrity, and other topics, under the guise of combating 'misinformation'."
- Judge banned administration from speaking with social media companies.

Supreme Court Extends Pause in Biden Social Media Contact Case



VOLOKH & RUMBLE V

JARAMENTES networks; hateful conduct prohibited"

- Requires social media to create and publish content moderation policies on "hateful conduct," and to create "mechanisms" by which users can report such "conduct."
- "Hateful conduct" is defined by the statute to include speech that can "vilify" or "humiliate" a group or a class on the basis of certain traits.
- Challenged in a lawsuit brought by several operators of online platforms, including law professor Eugene Volokh, represented by the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression (FIRE).
- The district court ruled in favor of Volokh and blocked the law from going into effect, holding that it likely compelled speech in violation of the First Amendment.
- New York appealed to the Second Circuit. NetChoice & CHOP filed an amicus brief <u>supporting</u> FIRE and urging the Second Circuit to affirm the lower court's decision. Our brief makes three key points:
- When social media services define, publish, and enforce community guidelines and when users share and receive expression on these services — they engage in speech, not conduct. New York cannot regulate speech by unilaterally renaming it 'conduct';
- The Online Hate Speech Law will not aid existing content moderation efforts to identify and remove offensive content online; and
- speech that criticizes local elected officials or supports or opposes LGBT rights. The Court should affirm to halt If New York's law can stand, other states can enforce similar statutes against other lawful speech, including continuing political efforts to influence online discourse in the Second Circuit.



PROTECTING FREE SPEECH FROM GOVERNMENT INTERFERENCE ACT

Makes clear that federal employees cannot use their government positions to coerce social media companies to remove content they don't like.

- Can't use public position for political purposes in coercing social media companies
- Has teeth holds the employees themselves to account and hits violators where it really hurts: their pensions and their paychecks.
- Those who break the law lose their jobs and their pensions.



TREATING EVERYONE AS A CHILD

- "business that provides an online service, product, or feature likely to be accessed by a child." "Child" is defined as under-18
- Government is getting between what a parent may want and their 17 year old
- ▶ Giving parents a false sense of security



LOSS OF ANONYMITY

- Since the law has "might be" or "could be" for 17 year-olds, businesses must get confirmation of the user and their age
- This would require some yet unknown tools to verify the user is NOT under 18 perhaps collecting a Driver's license and more information?



COLLECTING MORE INFORMATION?

- Need to verify the age of every user or treat everyone one the internet like an infant.
- Identity authentication functionally eliminates anonymous online activity.
- Harming many communities, such as minorities concerned about revealing their identity (e.g., LGBTQ), pregnant women seeking information about abortions, and whistleblowers.
- Just think about protestors who must tell the government who they are.


ILLEGAL

- Preempted by Children's Online Privacy
 Protection Act ("COPPA"), 15 U.S.C. §§ 6501
- Violates First Amendment
- Violates Due Process



NETCHOICE V BONTA

- The CAADCA regulates speech, not conduct, and is thus subject to First Amendment scrutiny.
- NetChoice is likely to succeed on the merits of its First Amendment claims, even under intermediate scrutiny.
- The CAADCA undermines, rather than protects, minors' privacy. Further, "age estimation" would likely be no less invasive, in practice, than "age verification."

NOT LEARNING FROM CALIFORNIA'S FAILURES

ARKANSAS'S BACKWARDS

SIMILAR TO CALIFORNIA

- Limited to only business of a certain size and specifically exempts certain companies
- Requires businesses to figure out how to do parental verification
- "shall not permit an Arkansas user who is a minor to be an account holder... unless the minor has the express consent of a parent or legal guardian."



NETCHOICE V GRIFFIN

- NetChoice is likely to succeed on the merits of its First Amendment claims.
- The law's various undefined terms, coupled with its myriad exceptions, render it unconstitutionally vague.
- Even under intermediate scrutiny, the law is likely unconstitutional because it would restrict adults' and minors' access to constitutionally protected speech.
- Discriminatory application
- Blocking access to the entire "mall" rather than the harmful stores.



PSYCHOLOGISTS IDENTIFYING CAUSES

- *Primary cause of the rise in mental disorders is a decline over decades in opportunities for children and teens to play, roam, and engage in other activities independent of direct oversight and control by adults."

How ean I protect my child

- Create a family media plan with expectations of how and when to use technology and social media.
- Learn about social media platforms and how they work.
- Make time to connect with your child device-free.
- Model responsible online behavior for your child.
- Reconsider allowing your child to have social media and encourage them to wait to use it until they are an adult.
- Create tech-free zones and find opportunities throughout the day to choose to put the screens away.
- Have open and honest discussions with your child about the harms of social media and spending time online.
