A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING TRANSPARENCY IN COVID-19 VACCINATION INFORMATION.

1 Whereas, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
2 (CDC), the average combined survival rate across all age groups from
3 COVID-19 is 99.9%; and

4 Whereas, the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS) is the
5 voluntary reporting system built in 1990 by the United States Department
6 of Health and Human Services and cosponsored by the CDC and the United
7 States Food and Drug Administration (FDA); and

8 Whereas, the FDA, as part of a pending court action, released the
9 first round of documents it reviewed before President Joseph Biden's
10 announcement that the FDA had reportedly approved and licensed the Pfizer
11 vaccine in its August 23, 2021 letter. One of the documents produced is a
12 "Cumulative Analysis of Post-Authorization Adverse Event Reports of [the
13 Vaccine] Received through 28-Feb-2021," which is a mere two and a half
14 months after the vaccine received its Emergency Use Authorization. This
15 document reflects 158,893 adverse events and 1,223 deaths following
16 vaccination that have completed Pfizer's "workflow cycle," both in and
17 outside the United States, up to February 28, 2021; and

18 Whereas, the United States annual influenza vaccination program,
19 which in 2021 vaccinated 195 million people, has only had between twenty
20 and thirty deaths reported to VAERS; and

21 Whereas, the average reported deaths from all vaccines in the United
22 States from 2011 to 2020 was 409.0 according to VAERS; and

23 Whereas, according to VAERS, the COVID-19 mass vaccination program
24 has fully vaccinated 210,000,000 people in the United States thus far,
25 with 22,000 plus reported deaths; and

26 Whereas, in 1976, the swine flu mass vaccination program that
27 vaccinated 55 million people led to 500 cases of Guillain-Barré Syndrome,
28 which can cause paralysis, and 25 deaths before the program stopped due to
29 safety concerns; and

30 Whereas, in Arizona, the total number of all deaths from all causes
31 in 2020 was 75,700, of which 25.2% was reported as due to major
32 cardiovascular disease, 16.7% was reported as due to cancer and 11.1% was
33 reported as due to COVID-19; and

34 Whereas, the CDC, responding to the erosion of the public's trust,
35 plans to update its data collection for analysis. The American public
36 confidence that the CDC is providing the public with trustworthy
37 information on preventing and treating COVID-19 fell to 72% in January
38 2022, down from 77% in November 2021, according to the Annenberg Public
39 Policy Center of the University of Pennsylvania; and

40 Whereas, health care professionals have testified and attested to
41 successfully treating COVID-19 using legacy off-label drugs despite
42 Remdesivir being the only FDA-approved treatment of COVID-19; and

43 Whereas, according to the CDC, natural immunity was six times
44 stronger during the Delta wave than vaccination.

1 Therefore

2 Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona, the House of
3 Representatives concurring:

4 1. That the Members of the Legislature support transparency in
5 COVID-19 vaccination information.

6 2. That the Members of the Legislature consider every Arizonan who
7 has died from and with COVID-19, including all life-threatening diseases,
8 a tragedy to be taken seriously and a reason for mourning.

9 3. That the Members of the Legislature agree with President Joseph
10 Biden when he stated that "there is no federal solution. This gets solved
11 at a state level" when referring to COVID-19, and that health policy
12 belongs to the states.

13 4. That the Secretary of State of the State of Arizona transmit a
14 copy of this Resolution to the President of the United States Senate, the
15 Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, each Member of
16 Congress from the State of Arizona and each President of the Senate and
17 Speaker of the House of Representatives of the other state legislatures.
