### **AN ACT**

AMENDING SECTIONS 32-2061, 32-2067, 32-2071, 32-2071.01, 32-2072 AND 32-2073, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO THE STATE BOARD OF PSYCHOLOGY EXAMINERS.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

2 Section 1. Section 32-2061, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
3 read:

4 32-2061. Definitions

5 In this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

6 1. "Active license" means a valid and existing license to practice  
7 psychology.

8 2. "Adequate records" means records ~~containing~~ THAT CONTAIN, at a  
9 minimum, sufficient information to identify the client or patient, the  
10 dates of service, the fee for service, the payments for service, the type  
11 of service given and copies of any reports that may have been made.

12 3. "Board" means the state board of psychologist examiners.

13 4. "Client" means a person or an entity that receives psychological  
14 services. A corporate entity, a governmental entity or any other  
15 organization may be a client if there is a professional contract to  
16 provide services or benefits primarily to an organization rather than to  
17 an individual. If an individual has a legal guardian, the legal guardian  
18 is the client for decision-making purposes, except that the individual  
19 receiving services is the client or patient for:

20 (a) Issues that directly affect the physical or emotional safety of  
21 the individual, such as sexual or other exploitative relationships.

22 (b) Issues that the LEGAL guardian agrees to specifically reserve  
23 to the individual.

24 5. "Committee on behavior analysts" means the committee established  
25 by section 32-2091.15.

26 6. "Exploit" means actions by a psychologist who takes undue  
27 advantage of the professional association with a client or patient, a  
28 student or a supervisee for the advantage or profit of the psychologist.

29 7. "Health care institution" means a facility as defined in section  
30 36-401.

31 8. "Letter of concern" means an advisory letter to notify a  
32 psychologist that while there is insufficient evidence to support  
33 disciplinary action the board believes the psychologist should modify or  
34 eliminate certain practices and that continuation of the activities that  
35 led to the information being submitted to the board may result in action  
36 against the psychologist's license.

37 9. "Patient" means a person who receives psychological services.  
38 If an individual has a legal guardian, the legal guardian is the client or  
39 patient for decision-making purposes, except that the individual receiving  
40 services is the client or patient for:

41 (a) Issues that directly affect the physical or emotional safety of  
42 the individual, such as sexual or other exploitative relationships.

43 (b) Issues that the LEGAL guardian agrees to specifically reserve  
44 to the individual.

- 1           10. "Practice of psychology" means the psychological assessment,  
2 diagnosis, treatment or correction of mental, emotional, behavioral or  
3 psychological abilities, illnesses or disorders or purporting or  
4 attempting to do this consistent with section 32-2076.
- 5           11. "Psychologically incompetent" means a person ~~lacking in~~ WHO  
6 LACKS sufficient psychological knowledge or skills to a degree likely to  
7 endanger the health of clients or patients.
- 8           12. "Psychological service" means all actions of the psychologist  
9 in the practice of psychology.
- 10          13. "Psychologist" means a natural person ~~holding~~ WHO HOLDS a  
11 license to practice psychology pursuant to this chapter.
- 12          14. "Supervisee" means any person who functions under the extended  
13 authority of the psychologist to provide, or while in training to provide,  
14 psychological services.
- 15          15. "Telepractice":
- 16           (a) Means providing psychological services through interactive  
17 audio, video or electronic communication that occurs between the  
18 psychologist and the patient or client, including any electronic  
19 communication for diagnostic, treatment or consultation purposes in a  
20 secure platform, and that meets the requirements of telehealth pursuant to  
21 section 36-3602. ~~Telepractice~~
- 22           (b) Includes supervision.
- 23          16. "Unprofessional conduct" includes the following activities  
24 whether occurring in this state or elsewhere:
- 25           (a) Obtaining a fee by fraud or misrepresentation.
- 26           (b) Betraying professional confidences.
- 27           (c) Making or using statements of a character tending to deceive or  
28 mislead.
- 29           (d) Aiding or abetting a person who is not licensed pursuant to  
30 this chapter in representing that person as a psychologist.
- 31           (e) COMMITTING gross negligence in the practice of a psychologist.
- 32           (f) HAVING sexual intimacies or sexual intercourse with a current  
33 client or patient or a supervisee or with a former client or patient  
34 within two years after the cessation or termination of treatment. For the  
35 purposes of this subdivision, "sexual intercourse" has the same meaning  
36 prescribed in section 13-1401.
- 37           (g) Engaging or offering to engage as a psychologist in activities  
38 that are not congruent with the psychologist's professional education,  
39 training and experience.
- 40           (h) Failing or refusing to maintain and retain adequate business,  
41 financial or professional records pertaining to the psychological services  
42 provided to a client or patient.

1 (i) ~~Commission of~~ COMMITTING a felony, whether or not involving  
2 moral turpitude, or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude. In either  
3 case, conviction by a court of competent jurisdiction or a plea of no  
4 contest is conclusive evidence of the commission.

5 (j) Making a fraudulent or untrue statement to the board or its  
6 investigators, staff or consultants.

7 (k) Violating any federal or state laws or rules that relate to the  
8 practice of psychology or to obtaining a license to practice psychology.

9 (l) Practicing psychology while impaired or incapacitated to the  
10 extent and in a manner that jeopardizes the welfare of the client or  
11 patient or renders the psychological services provided ineffective.

12 (m) Using fraud, misrepresentation or deception to obtain or  
13 attempt to obtain a psychology license or to pass or attempt to pass a  
14 psychology licensing examination or in assisting another person to do so.

15 (n) COMMITTING unprofessional conduct in another jurisdiction that  
16 resulted in censure, probation or a civil penalty or in the denial,  
17 suspension, restriction or revocation of a certificate or license to  
18 practice as a psychologist.

19 (o) Providing services that are unnecessary or unsafe or otherwise  
20 engaging in activities as a psychologist that are unprofessional by  
21 current standards of practice.

22 (p) Falsely or fraudulently claiming to have performed a  
23 professional service, charging for a service or representing a service as  
24 the licensee's own when the licensee has not rendered the service or  
25 assumed supervisory responsibility for the service.

26 (q) Representing activities or services as being performed under  
27 the licensee's supervision if the psychologist has not assumed  
28 responsibility for them and has not exercised control, oversight and  
29 review.

30 (r) Failing to obtain a client's or patient's informed and written  
31 consent to release personal or otherwise confidential information to  
32 another party unless the release is otherwise authorized by law.

33 (s) Failing to make client or patient records in the psychologist's  
34 possession promptly available to another psychologist who is licensed  
35 pursuant to this chapter on receipt of proper authorization to do so from  
36 the client or patient, a minor client's or patient's parent, the client's  
37 or patient's legal guardian or the client's or patient's authorized  
38 representative or failing to comply with title 12, chapter 13, article  
39 7.1.

40 (t) Failing to take reasonable steps to inform or protect a  
41 client's or patient's intended victim and inform the proper law  
42 enforcement officials in circumstances in which the psychologist becomes  
43 aware during the course of providing or supervising psychological services  
44 that ~~a~~ THE client or patient intends or plans to inflict serious bodily  
45 harm on another person.

1 (u) Failing to take reasonable steps to protect a client or patient  
2 in circumstances in which the psychologist becomes aware during the course  
3 of providing or supervising psychological services that ~~a~~ THE client or  
4 patient intends or plans to inflict serious bodily harm on self.

5 (v) Abandoning or neglecting a client or patient in need of  
6 immediate care without making suitable arrangements for continuation of  
7 the care.

8 (w) Engaging in direct or indirect personal solicitation of clients  
9 or patients through the use of coercion, duress, undue influence,  
10 compulsion or intimidation practices.

11 (x) Engaging in false, deceptive or misleading advertising.

12 (y) Exploiting a client or patient, a student or a supervisee.

13 (z) Failing to report information to the board regarding a possible  
14 act of unprofessional conduct committed by another psychologist who is  
15 licensed pursuant to this chapter unless this reporting violates the  
16 psychologist's confidential relationship with the client or patient  
17 pursuant to section 32-2085. Any psychologist who reports or provides  
18 information to the board in good faith is not subject to an action for  
19 civil damages. For the purposes of this subdivision, it is not an act of  
20 unprofessional conduct if a licensee addresses an ethical conflict in a  
21 manner that is consistent with the ethical standards contained in the  
22 document entitled "ethical principles of psychologists and code of  
23 conduct" as adopted by the American psychological association and in  
24 effect at the time the licensee makes the report.

25 (aa) Violating a formal board order, consent agreement, term of  
26 probation or stipulated agreement issued under this chapter.

27 (bb) Failing to furnish information in a timely manner to the board  
28 or its investigators or representatives if requested or subpoenaed by the  
29 board as prescribed by this chapter.

30 (cc) Failing to make available to a client or patient or to the  
31 client's or patient's designated representative, on written request, a  
32 copy of the client's or patient's record, ~~including~~ EXCLUDING raw test  
33 data, psychometric testing materials and other information as provided by  
34 law.

35 (dd) Violating an ethical standard adopted by the board.

36 Sec. 2. Section 32-2067, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
37 read:

38 32-2067. Fees; alternative payment methods

39 A. The board, by a formal vote at its annual fall meeting, may  
40 establish fees and penalties that do not exceed:

41 1. ~~Four hundred dollars~~ \$400 for an application for an active  
42 license to practice psychology.

43 2. ~~Two hundred dollars~~ \$200 for an application for a temporary  
44 license to practice psychology.

- 1           3. ~~Two hundred fifty dollars~~ \$250 for reapplication for an active
- 2 license.
- 3           4. ~~Five hundred dollars~~ \$500 for issuing an initial license. The
- 4 board shall prorate this fee pursuant to subsection D of this section.
- 5           5. ~~Fifty dollars~~ \$50 for a duplicate license.
- 6           6. ~~Five hundred dollars~~ \$500 for biennial renewal of an active
- 7 license.
- 8           7. ~~Eighty-five dollars~~ \$85 for biennial renewal of an inactive
- 9 license.
- 10          8. ~~Three hundred dollars~~ \$300 for the reinstatement of an active or
- 11 inactive license.
- 12          9. ~~Three hundred fifty dollars~~ \$350 for any additional examination.
- 13          10. ~~Two hundred fifty dollars~~ \$250 for delinquent compliance with
- 14 continuing education requirements.
- 15          11. ~~Five dollars~~ \$5 for the sale of a duplicate renewal receipt.
- 16          12. ~~Five dollars~~ \$5 for the sale of a copy of the board's statutes
- 17 and rules.
- 18          13. ~~Two dollars~~ \$2 for verification of a license.
- 19          14. ~~Ten dollars~~ \$10 for the sale of each audiotape of board
- 20 meetings.
- 21          15. ~~Five cents~~ \$.05 per name for the sale of computerized discs that
- 22 contain the name of each licensee.
- 23          16. ~~Twenty-five cents~~ \$.25 per name for the sale of computerized
- 24 discs that contain the name and address of each licensee.
- 25          17. ~~Thirty-five cents~~ \$.35 per name for the sale of customized
- 26 computerized discs that contain additional licensee information that is
- 27 not required by law to remain confidential.
- 28          18. ~~Twenty-five cents~~ \$.25 per page for copying records, documents,
- 29 letters, minutes, applications, files and policy statements. This fee
- 30 includes postage.
- 31          B. The board may charge additional fees for services the board
- 32 deems necessary and appropriate to carry out this chapter. These fees
- 33 shall not exceed the actual cost of providing the service.
- 34          C. The board shall not refund fees except as provided in section
- 35 32-2073, subsection ~~G~~ H. On special request and for good cause the board
- 36 may return the license renewal fee.
- 37          D. The board shall prorate the fee for issuing an initial license
- 38 by dividing the biennial renewal fee by twenty-four and multiplying that
- 39 amount by the number of months that remain until the next biennial renewal
- 40 date.
- 41          E. Subject to the requirements of section 41-2544, the executive
- 42 director may enter into agreements to allow licensees to pay fees by
- 43 alternative methods, including credit cards, charge cards, debit cards and
- 44 electronic funds transfers.

1           Sec. 3. Section 32-2071, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
2 read:

3           32-2071. Qualifications of applicants; education; training

4           A. An applicant for licensure shall have a doctoral degree from an  
5 institution of higher education in clinical or counseling psychology,  
6 school or educational psychology or any other subject area in applied  
7 psychology acceptable to the board and shall have completed a doctoral  
8 program in psychology from an educational institution that has:

9           1. Been accredited by one of the following regional accrediting  
10 agencies at the time of the applicant's graduation:

- 11           (a) The New England association of schools and colleges.
- 12           (b) The middle states association of colleges and schools.
- 13           (c) The north central association of colleges and schools.
- 14           (d) The northwest association of schools and colleges.
- 15           (e) The southern association of colleges and schools.
- 16           (f) The western association of schools and colleges.

17           2. A program that is identified and labeled as a psychology program  
18 and that stands as a recognized, coherent organizational entity within the  
19 institution with clearly identified entry and exit criteria for graduate  
20 students in the program.

21           3. An identifiable psychology faculty in the area of health service  
22 delivery and a psychologist responsible for the program.

23           4. A core program that requires each student to demonstrate  
24 competence by passing suitable comprehensive examinations or by  
25 successfully completing at least three or more graduate semester hours,  
26 five or more quarter hours or six or more trimester hours or by other  
27 suitable means in the following content areas:

- 28           (a) Scientific and professional ethics and standards in psychology.
- 29           (b) Research, which may include design, methodology, statistics and  
30 psychometrics.

31           (c) The biological ~~basis~~ BASES of behavior, which may include  
32 physiological psychology, comparative psychology, neuropsychology,  
33 sensation and perception and psychopharmacology.

34           (d) The cognitive-affective ~~basis~~ BASES of behavior, which may  
35 include learning, thinking, motivation and emotion.

36           (e) The social ~~basis~~ BASES of behavior, which may include social  
37 psychology, group processes, cultural diversity and organizational and  
38 systems theory.

39           (f) Individual differences, which may include personality theory,  
40 human development and abnormal psychology.

41           (g) Assessment, which includes instruction in interviewing and  
42 administering, scoring and interpreting psychological test batteries to  
43 diagnose cognitive abilities and personality functioning.

1 (h) Treatment modalities, which include instruction in the theory  
2 and application of a diverse range of psychological interventions to treat  
3 mental, emotional, psychological and behavioral disorders.

4 5. A psychology program that leads to a doctoral degree requiring  
5 at least the equivalent of three full-time academic years of graduate  
6 study, two years of which are at the institution from which the doctoral  
7 degree is granted.

8 6. A requirement that the student must successfully defend a  
9 dissertation, the content of which is primarily psychological, or an  
10 equivalent project acceptable to the board.

11 7. Official transcripts that have been prepared solely by the  
12 institution and not by the student and, except for manifest clerical  
13 errors or grade changes, have not been altered by the institution after  
14 the student's graduation.

15 8. Given the student credit only for coursework that is listed on  
16 its official transcripts and that is obtained only at regionally  
17 accredited educational institutions as listed in paragraph 1 of this  
18 subsection and does not give credit for continuing education experiences  
19 or courses.

20 B. If the institution is located outside the United States, the  
21 applicant shall demonstrate that the program meets the requirements of  
22 subsection A, paragraphs 2 through 7 and subsections C through M of this  
23 section.

24 C. The applicant shall complete relevant didactic courses of the  
25 program required under subsection A, paragraph 4 of this section before  
26 starting the supervised professional experiences as described pursuant to  
27 subsection F of this section.

28 D. Each applicant for licensure shall obtain three thousand hours  
29 of supervised professional work experiences. The applicant shall  
30 demonstrate clearly how the applicant met this requirement. The applicant  
31 shall obtain a minimum of one thousand five hundred hours through an  
32 internship as described in subsection F of this section. The applicant  
33 shall obtain the remaining one thousand five hundred hours through any  
34 combination of the following:

35 1. Supervised preinternship professional experiences as described  
36 in subsection E of this section.

37 2. Additional internship hours as described in subsection F of this  
38 section.

39 3. Supervised postdoctoral experiences as described in subsection G  
40 of this section.

41 E. If the applicant chooses to include up to one thousand five  
42 hundred hours of supervised preinternship professional experience to  
43 satisfy a portion of the three thousand hours of supervised professional  
44 experience, the following requirements must be met:



1           1. The applicant's supervised preinternship professional  
2 experiences shall reflect a faculty directed, organized, sequential series  
3 of supervised experiences of increasing complexity that follows  
4 appropriate academic coursework and that prepares the applicant for an  
5 internship.

6           2. The applicant's supervised preinternship professional  
7 experiences shall follow appropriate academic preparation. There must be  
8 a written training plan between the student and the graduate training  
9 program. The training plan for each supervised preinternship professional  
10 experience training site must designate an allotment of time for each  
11 training activity and must ensure the quality, breadth and depth of  
12 training experience by specifying goals and objectives of the supervised  
13 preinternship professional experience, the methods of evaluation of the  
14 student and supervisory experiences. If supervision is to be completed by  
15 qualified site supervisors at external sites, their approval must be  
16 included in the plan.

17           3. More than one part-time supervised preinternship professional  
18 experience placement of appropriate scope and complexity over the course  
19 of the graduate training may be combined to satisfy the one thousand five  
20 hundred hours of supervised preinternship professional experiences.

21           4. Every twenty hours of supervised preinternship professional  
22 experience must include the following:

23           (a) At least fifty percent of the supervised preinternship  
24 professional experiences must be in psychological service-related  
25 activities. Psychological service-related activities may include  
26 treatment, assessment, interviews, report writing, case presentations,  
27 seminars on applied issues providing cotherapy, group supervision and  
28 consultations.

29           (b) At least twenty-five percent of the supervised preinternship  
30 professional experiences must be devoted to face-to-face patient-client  
31 contact.

32           (c) At least one hour per week of regularly scheduled  
33 contemporaneous in-person individual supervision per twenty hours of  
34 supervised preinternship professional experience that addresses the direct  
35 psychological services provided by the student.

36           (d) At least two hours of regularly scheduled contemporaneous  
37 supervision per twenty hours of supervised preinternship professional  
38 experience that addresses the direct psychological services provided by  
39 the student. At least fifty percent of the supervision during the total  
40 supervised preinternship professional experience shall be provided through  
41 contemporaneous in-person individual supervision. Not more than fifty  
42 percent shall be through in-person group supervision. At least  
43 seventy-five percent of the supervision shall be by a psychologist who is  
44 licensed or certified to practice psychology at the independent level by a  
45 licensing jurisdiction of the United States or Canada and who is

1 designated by the academic program. Not more than twenty-five percent of  
2 the supervision shall be by a licensed mental health professional who is  
3 licensed or certified by a licensing jurisdiction of the United States or  
4 Canada, a psychology intern currently under the supervision of a licensed  
5 psychologist or an individual completing a postdoctoral supervised  
6 experience currently under the supervision of a licensed psychologist.

7 5. The applicant must provide to the board the written training  
8 plan developed by the applicant's program and documentation of the total  
9 hours accrued by the applicant during the supervised preinternship  
10 professional experience, including the number of face-to-face  
11 patient-client contact hours and the amount of supervision and  
12 qualifications of the supervisors for the entire supervised preinternship  
13 professional experiences. Documentation must include an acknowledgement  
14 that ethics training was included throughout the supervised preinternship  
15 professional experience.

16 6. Supervised professional preinternship experiences must be  
17 completed within seventy-two months.

18 F. The applicant shall have one thousand five hundred hours of  
19 supervised professional experience, which shall be either an internship  
20 that is approved by the American psychological association committee on  
21 accreditation, an internship that is a member of the association of  
22 psychology postdoctoral and internship centers or an organized training  
23 program that is designed to provide the trainee with a planned, programmed  
24 sequence of training experience, the focus and purpose of which are to  
25 ensure breadth and quality of training, and that meets the following  
26 requirements:

27 1. The training program has a clearly designated staff psychologist  
28 who is responsible for the integrity and quality of the training and who  
29 is licensed or certified to practice psychology at the independent level  
30 by any licensing jurisdiction of the United States or Canada in which the  
31 program exists.

32 2. The training program provides at least two psychologists on  
33 staff as supervisors, at least one of whom is licensed or certified to  
34 practice psychology at the independent level by a licensing jurisdiction  
35 of the United States or Canada in which the program exists and at least  
36 one of whom is directly available to the trainee in case of emergency.

37 3. Supervision is provided by the person who carries clinical  
38 responsibility for the cases being supervised. At least half of the  
39 training supervision shall be provided by one or more psychologists.

40 4. Training includes a range of assessment, consultation and  
41 treatment activities conducted directly with clients or patients.

42 5. A minimum of twenty-five percent of a trainee's supervised  
43 professional experience hours is in direct client or patient contact.

44 6. Training includes regular in-person, individual supervision  
45 conducted on a contemporaneous basis, with a minimum of one hour of

1 in-person, individual supervision for each twenty hours of experience and  
2 with the specific intent of dealing with psychological services rendered  
3 directly by the trainee and at least two additional hours per week in  
4 other learning activities. The supervisor shall ensure that the  
5 telepractice supervision is conducted using secure, confidential real-time  
6 visual telecommunication.

7 7. The training program includes interaction with other psychology  
8 trainees.

9 8. Trainees have a title that designates their trainee status.

10 9. The applicant provides from the training organization a written  
11 statement that describes the goals and content of the training program and  
12 documents that clear expectations existed for the breadth, depth and  
13 quality and quantity of a trainee's work at the time of the supervised  
14 professional experience.

15 10. The supervised professional experience is completed within  
16 twenty-four consecutive months.

17 G. Not more than one thousand five hundred hours of supervised  
18 professional experience shall be postdoctoral and may start on written  
19 certification by the applicant's education program that the applicant has  
20 satisfied all requirements for the doctoral degree and on written  
21 certification that the applicant has completed an appropriate supervised  
22 professional experience as required in subsection F of this section. The  
23 applicant may complete more than one thousand five hundred hours of a  
24 supervised postdoctoral experience, but not more than one thousand five  
25 hundred hours may count towards the requirements of this subsection. The  
26 one thousand five hundred hours of supervised professional experience  
27 shall meet the following requirements:

28 1. Supervision is conducted by a psychologist who is licensed or  
29 certified to practice psychology at the independent level in any licensing  
30 jurisdiction of the United States or Canada in which the supervision  
31 occurs or by a psychologist who is on full-time active duty in the United  
32 States armed services and who is licensed or certified by a board of  
33 psychologist examiners in a United States jurisdiction, who has been  
34 licensed or certified for at least two years and who is competent in the  
35 areas of professional practice in which the supervisee is receiving  
36 supervised professional experience.

37 2. The supervisor takes full legal responsibility for the welfare  
38 of the client or patient as well as the diagnosis, intervention and  
39 outcome of the intervention and takes reasonable steps to ensure that  
40 clients or patients are informed of the supervisee's training and status  
41 and that clients or patients may meet with the supervisor at the client's  
42 or patient's request.

43 3. The supervisor or the appropriate custodian of records is  
44 responsible for ensuring that adequate records of client or patient

1 contacts are maintained and that the client or patient is informed that  
2 the source of access to this information in the future is the supervisor.

3 4. The supervisor is fully available for consultation in the event  
4 of an emergency and provides emergency consultation coverage for the  
5 supervisee.

6 5. Regular in-person, individual supervision is conducted on a  
7 contemporaneous basis, with a minimum of one hour of in-person, individual  
8 supervision for each twenty hours of supervised professional experience.  
9 At least forty percent of the supervisee's time shall be in direct contact  
10 with clients or patients. The supervisor shall ensure that the  
11 telepractice supervision is conducted using secure, confidential real-time  
12 visual telecommunication technology.

13 6. The supervised professional experience as described in this  
14 subsection is completed within thirty-six consecutive months.

15 7. The applicant provides from the training organization a written  
16 training plan that describes the goals and content of the training  
17 experience and documents that clear expectations existed for the breadth,  
18 depth and quality and quantity of a trainee's work at the time of the  
19 supervised professional experience.

20 H. In meeting the supervised preinternship professional experience  
21 as described in subsection E of this section and the supervised  
22 professional experience as described in subsections F and G of this  
23 section, an applicant shall not receive credit for more than forty hours  
24 of experience per week.

25 I. An applicant who does not satisfy the supervised professional  
26 experience requirements of subsection F of this section may qualify on  
27 demonstration of twenty years' licensed or certified practice as a

29 J. An applicant who does not satisfy the supervised preinternship  
30 professional experience requirements of subsection E of this section or  
31 the supervised professional experience requirements of subsection G of
