AN ACT

AMENDING LAWS 2022, CHAPTER 313, SECTION 110; RELATING TO CORRECTION OFFICERS.

(TEXT OF BILL BEGINS ON NEXT PAGE)

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

2 Section 1. Laws 2022, chapter 313, section 110 is amended to read:

3 Sec. 110. Department of emergency and military affairs;
border security; exemption; fiscal year 2022-2023

4 A. The sum of \$209,205,000 is appropriated from the border security
5 fund established by section 26-105, Arizona Revised Statutes, in fiscal
6 year 2022-2023 to the department of emergency and military affairs. The
7 department of emergency and military affairs shall allocate, in
8 consultation with the department of public safety, the following amounts:

9 1. \$20,000,000 to Cochise county to construct a new county jail
10 facility. The monies allocated in this paragraph are intended to fund up
11 to twenty percent of the total jail facility construction cost but not to
12 exceed \$20,000,000. The monies allocated in this paragraph shall not be
13 distributed until Cochise county has submitted to the director of the
14 joint legislative budget committee, the director of the governor's office
15 of strategic planning and budgeting and the director of the department of
16 administration a report that the county has raised sufficient monies to
17 fund the remainder of the project's budget. Notwithstanding section
18 41-1252, Arizona Revised Statutes, the monies allocated in this paragraph
19 are not subject to review by the joint committee on capital review. Any
20 monies allocated pursuant to this paragraph that remain unexpended and
21 unencumbered on June 30, 2027 revert to the border security fund
22 established by section 26-105, Arizona Revised Statutes.

23 2. \$15,000,000 to reimburse a county or local law enforcement
24 agency for costs incurred by the county or local law enforcement agency
25 for participating in a program with the United States immigration and
26 customs enforcement pursuant to 8 United States code section 1357(g).

27 3. \$10,000,000 for deposit in the antihuman trafficking grant fund
28 established by section 26-106, Arizona Revised Statutes. The monies shall
29 be allocated as follows:

30 (a) \$2,000,000 to the department of public safety Arizona counter
31 terrorism information center for antihuman trafficking operations that
32 comply with the requirements prescribed in section 26-106, Arizona Revised
33 Statutes.

34 (b) \$8,000,000 in award grants to city, town and county law
35 enforcement agencies, in an amount of not more than \$500,000 per agency,
36 for programs that reduce human trafficking and that comply with the
37 requirements prescribed in section 26-106, Arizona Revised Statutes.

38 4. \$30,000,000 to distribute to cities, towns or counties for costs
39 associated with prosecuting and imprisoning individuals charged with drug
40 trafficking, human smuggling, illegal immigration and other border-related
41 crimes.

1 5. \$10,000,000 for costs incurred by Arizona national guard assets
2 augmenting and supporting the department of public safety and local law
3 enforcement agencies relating to violations of the laws of this state in
4 the southern Arizona border region.

5 6. \$10,000,000 for emergency health care and testing for immigrants
6 along the southern Arizona border.

7 7. \$15,000,000 for transportation of individuals who entered
8 Arizona seeking asylum to other states in the United States, including the
9 cost of meals, onboard staffing and support.

10 8. \$53,405,000 for deputy sheriff compensation to be distributed to
11 the department of administration for the following purposes:

12 (a) \$48,310,000 to counties for the purposes of a \$10,000 onetime
13 payment to line-level deputies and detention officers employed by each
14 county sheriff's office as of May 1, 2022. The county shall distribute
15 the payment to eligible employees **OVER TWO YEARS. IN THE FIRST YEAR, THE**
PAYMENT SHALL BE DISTRIBUTED in equal quarterly installments **~~over two~~**
years. IN THE SECOND YEAR, THE PAYMENT SHALL BE DISTRIBUTED IN A LUMP SUM
DURING THE FIRST MONTH OF THE YEAR. If the amount is insufficient for a
19 \$10,000 per employee payment, the department shall distribute a prorated
20 amount based on the total number of deputies and detention officers
21 employed. On or before August 30, 2023 and August 30, 2024, each county
22 sheriff shall submit a report to the department of administration on the
23 actual use of the monies received and the most recent staffing and
24 retention data for the positions receiving the payment. On or before
25 September 30, 2023 and September 23, 2024, the department of
26 administration shall submit a report to the directors of the joint
27 legislative budget committee and the governor's office of strategic
28 planning and budgeting detailing the total amounts distributed by county
29 and summarizing the individual county reports.

30 (b) \$5,095,000 to counties for the purposes of a \$5,000 onetime
31 payment to line-level deputies and detention officers hired between May 1,
32 2022 and May 1, 2023. The county shall distribute the payment to eligible
33 employees in **~~equal quarterly installments over one year~~** **A LUMP SUM.** On
34 June 1, 2023, the department of administration shall distribute the
35 funding to the counties based on the actual number of hires during this
36 time period, as demonstrated by each county. If the amount is
37 insufficient for a \$5,000 per employee payment, the department shall
38 distribute a prorated amount based on the total number of hired detention
39 officers and sheriff's deputies. On or before June 30, 2023, the
40 department shall submit a report to the directors of the joint legislative
41 budget committee and the governor's office of strategic planning and
42 budgeting detailing the amounts distributed to each county.

43 9. \$800,000 for the purposes prescribed in section 26-174, Arizona
44 Revised Statutes, regarding the established chain of command within the
45 Arizona state guard.

1 10. \$30,000,000 for the construction costs of a state emergency
2 operations center. Pursuant to section 41-1252, Arizona Revised Statutes,
3 before spending the monies allocated in this paragraph, the department of
4 emergency and military affairs shall submit for review by the joint
5 committee on capital review the scope, purpose and estimated cost of the
6 capital improvements.

7 11. \$15,000,000 to the department of public safety for the
8 construction costs of a southern border coordinated response center.
9 Pursuant to section 41-1252, Arizona Revised Statutes, before spending the
10 monies allocated in this paragraph, the department of public safety shall
11 submit for review by the joint committee on capital review the scope,
12 purpose and estimated cost of the capital improvements.

13 B. Within thirty days after the end of each calendar quarter until
14 the monies appropriated by this section are fully expended, the department
15 of emergency and military affairs, in consultation with the Arizona
16 department of homeland security and the department of public safety, shall
17 report to the joint legislative budget committee on the status of the
18 project allocations and monies expended as prescribed by this section.

19 C. The department of emergency and military affairs may transfer
20 spending authority between and within the programs and purposes listed in
21 subsection A of this section. Before making a transfer, the department
22 shall submit the proposed transfer to the joint legislative budget
23 committee for review.

24 D. The appropriations made in subsection A of this section are
25 exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes,
26 relating to lapsing of appropriations.
