The operating lump sum appropriation includes \$683,900 and 8.5 FTE positions for average daily membership auditing and \$200,000 and 2 FTE positions for information technology security services.

The amount appropriated for the department of education's operating budget includes \$500,000 for technical assistance and state-level administration of the K-3 reading program established pursuant to section 15-211, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Any monies available to the department of education pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 8, Arizona Revised Statutes, for the failing schools tutoring fund established by section 15-241, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Any monies available to the department of education pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 6, Arizona Revised Statutes, for character education matching grants pursuant to section 15-154.01, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 6, Arizona Revised Statutes. 1

<u>Basic state aid</u>

The appropriation for basic state aid provides basic state support to school districts for maintenance and operations funding as provided by section 15-973, Arizona Revised Statutes, and includes an estimated \$328,895,600 in expendable income derived from the permanent state school fund and from state trust lands pursuant to section 37-521, subsection B, Arizona Revised Statutes, for fiscal year 2022-2023.

8 Monies derived from the permanent state school fund and any other 9 non-state general fund revenue source that is dedicated to fund basic 10 state aid shall be spent, whenever possible, before spending state general 11 fund monies.

12 Except as required by section 37-521, Arizona Revised Statutes, all 13 monies received during the fiscal year from national forests, interest collected on deferred payments on the purchase of state lands, income from 14 15 investing permanent state school funds as prescribed by the enabling act 16 and the Constitution of Arizona and all monies received by the 17 superintendent of public instruction from whatever source, except monies 18 received pursuant to sections 15-237 and 15-531, Arizona Revised Statutes, 19 when paid into the state treasury are appropriated for apportionment to 20 the various counties in accordance with law. An expenditure may not be 21 made except as specifically authorized above.

Any monies available to the department of education pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 5, Arizona Revised Statutes, for the increased cost of basic state aid under section 15-971, Arizona Revised Statutes, due to added school days in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 5, Arizona Revised Statutes.

<u>Other programs</u>

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Any monies available to the department of education for the classroom site fund pursuant to section 37-521, subsection B, paragraph 4, Arizona Revised Statutes, and section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 10, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 37-521, subsection B, paragraph 4, Arizona Revised Statutes, and section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 10, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Any monies available to the department of education from the instructional improvement fund established by section 15-979, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 15-979, Arizona Revised Statutes.

40 Before making any changes to the achievement testing program that 41 will increase program costs, the department of education and the state 42 board of education shall submit the estimated fiscal impact of those 43 changes to the joint legislative budget committee for review.

Any monies available to the department of education for accountability purposes pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 7, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure
 authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02,
 subsection A, paragraph 7, Arizona Revised Statutes.

The appropriated amount for adult education includes \$4,620,000 for the continuing high school and workforce training program established by section 15-217.01, Arizona Revised Statutes, \$6,000,000 for deposit in the adult workforce diploma program fund established by section 15-217.02, subsection B, Arizona Revised Statutes and \$6,000,000 for deposit in the community college adult education workforce development program fund established by section 15-217.03, subsection C, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Monies appropriated for CTED completion grants are intended to help fund program completion for students who complete at least fifty percent of a career technical education program before graduating from high school and who successfully complete the career technical education district program after graduating from high school. The application procedures shall award grant funding only after an eligible student has successfully completed a career technical education district program.

18 Ιf the appropriated amount for CTED completion grants is 19 insufficient to fund all grant requests from career technical education 20 districts, the department of education shall reduce grant amounts on a 21 proportional basis in order to cap total statewide allocations at 22 \$1.000.000.

The appropriated amount for CTED completion grants is exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations, until June 30, 2024.

The department of education shall distribute the appropriated amount for CTED soft capital and equipment to career technical education districts with fewer than two thousand average daily membership pupils for soft capital and equipment expenses. The appropriated amount shall be allocated on a pro rata basis based on the average daily membership of eligible career technical education districts.

32 The department of education shall use the appropriated amount for English learner administration to provide English language acquisition 33 services for the purposes of section 15-756.07, Arizona Revised Statutes, 34 35 and for the costs of providing English language proficiency assessments, 36 scoring and ancillary materials as prescribed by the department of 37 education to school districts and charter schools for the purposes of 38 title 15, chapter 7, article 3.1, Arizona Revised Statutes. The 39 department may use a portion of the appropriated amount to hire staff or 40 contract with a third party to carry out the purposes of section 41 15-756.07, Arizona Revised Statutes. Notwithstanding section 41-192, 42 Arizona Revised Statutes, the superintendent of public instruction also 43 may use a portion of the appropriated amount to contract with one or more 44 private attorneys to provide legal services in connection with the case of 45 Flores v. State of Arizona, No. CIV 92-596-TUC-RCC.

1 The amount appropriated for foster home youth transitional housing 2 shall be distributed to the East valley institute of technology for a 3 transitional housing unit. The legislature intends that the monies be 4 used to construct and furnish a sixty-four bed transitional housing unit 5 for foster youths AND FORMER FOSTER YOUTHS who are at least seventeen 6 years of age but not more than twenty-one TWENTY-THREE years of age and 7 who need stable housing in order to obtain a high school diploma or a high 8 school equivalency diploma and who are earning an industry certification 9 in a program offered by the East valley institute of technology OR AN 10 ASSOCIATE DEGREE. On or before September 15 in years 2025, 2026 and 2027, 11 the superintendent of the East valley institute of technology shall submit 12 a report to the governor, the president of the senate, the speaker of the 13 house of representatives and the directors of the joint legislative budget 14 committee and the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting, and provide a copy to the secretary of state, detailing the total number 15 16 of foster youths who lived in the transitional housing unit during the 17 immediately preceding fiscal year and the progress that each foster youth 18 made toward obtaining a high school diploma or a high school equivalency 19 diploma and earning an industry certification during the fiscal year.

The department of education shall use the appropriated amount for geographic literacy to issue a grant to a statewide geographic alliance for strengthening geographic literacy in this state.

The department of education shall use the appropriated amount for jobs for Arizona graduates to issue a grant to a nonprofit organization for a JOBS for Arizona graduates program.

The department of education shall use the amount appropriated for onetime electronic incident prevention programs for the purposes of awarding student safety grants to public schools. A public school that receives a student safety grant under this section shall use the grant monies to procure and implement an electronic incident prevention program.

31 The amount appropriated for the school safety program includes an 32 increase of \$50,000,000 for additional school safety grants. In 33 allocating the \$50,000,000 increase, the department of education shall first distribute monies to schools on the school safety program waiting 34 35 list to receive grants for the costs of placing school resource officers 36 on school campuses. The awarded grants may not supplant funding provided 37 by local governments for school resource officers. If the total cost of 38 funding new grants for school resource officer costs is less than 39 \$50,000,000, the department may allocate the remaining monies to grants to 40 schools for the costs of placing school counselors and social workers on 41 school campuses pursuant section 15-154, Arizona Revised Statutes.

42 Any monies available to the department of education for school 43 safety pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 6, Arizona 44 Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph
 Arizona Revised Statutes.

After review by the joint legislative budget committee, in fiscal year 2022-2023, the department of education may use a portion of its fiscal year 2022-2023 state general fund appropriations for basic state aid, additional state aid or the special education fund to fund a shortfall in funding for basic state aid, additional state aid or the special education fund, if any, that occurred in fiscal year 2021-2022.

9 The department shall provide an updated report on its budget status every three months for the first half of each fiscal year and every month 10 11 thereafter to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of chairpersons of the 12 representatives. the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees, the director of the joint 13 legislative budget committee and the director of the governor's office of 14 15 strategic planning and budgeting. Each report shall include, at a 16 minimum, the department's current funding surplus or shortfall projections 17 for basic state aid and other major formula-based programs and is due 18 thirty days after the end of the applicable reporting period.

Within fifteen days after each apportionment of state aid that occurs pursuant to section 15-973, subsection B, Arizona Revised Statutes, the department shall post on its website the amount of state aid apportioned to each recipient and the underlying data.

Notwithstanding section 15-901.03, Arizona Revised Statutes, the 23 24 superintendent of public instruction may transfer \$5,000,000 from the state general fund appropriation for basic state aid for fiscal year 25 26 2021-2022 to the results-based funding program for fiscal year 2021-2022 without review by the joint legislative budget committee. Any amount 27 transferred to the results-based funding program under this section that 28 29 exceeds the amount needed to address a funding shortfall for the results-based funding program for fiscal year 2021-2022 reverts to the 30 31 state general fund on June 30, 2022.

9 The monies in the Gila River nonnative species eradication line item are for nonnative vegetation species eradication projects, including 10 11 projects to replace nonnative vegetation species with native vegetation species and restoring habitat for wildlife, in and along the portion of 12 13 the Gila River between the western boundary of the city of Avondale and the bridge over the Gila River at State Route 85. The Arizona department 14 15 of forestry and fire management shall serve as the fiscal agent and 16 contractor for the projects described in this paragraph. The department 17 may subcontract for the eradication and other required services for the 18 projects pursuant to title 34, chapter 6, article 1, Arizona Revised 19 Statutes, to expedite the projects.

20 On or before September 1, 2023, September 1, 2024 and September 1, 21 2025 OF EACH YEAR UNTIL ALL MONIES IN THE GILA RIVER NONNATIVE SPECIES 22 ERADICATION LINE ITEM ARE SPENT, the department shall report to the 23 director of the joint legislative budget committee on the expected amount 24 and purpose of expenditures from the Gila River nonnative species 25 eradication line item. The report shall include projected line item 26 detail. The reports shall also provide follow-up on areas previously 27 treated with funding from the line item and whether the nonnative species 28 have returned.

The appropriation made in the Gila River nonnative species eradication line item is exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations, except all monies remaining unencumbered or unexpended for the purposes of this section on June 30, 2025 2029 revert to the state general fund.

The appropriation for the hazardous vegetation removal line item is exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations, until June 30, 2024.

The appropriation for the wildfire emergency response line item shall be used for the purposes and is subject to the restrictions outlined in Laws 2021, first special session, chapter 1, as amended by Laws 2022, chapter 1, section 1. The monies appropriated in the wildfire emergency response line item are exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations, through June 30, 2025. From the amount appropriated for the wildfire emergency response line item, \$3,000,000 shall be used for purposes related to the Woodbury fire.

Sec. 3. Laws 2022, chapter 313, section 110, as amended by Laws 2023, chapter 121, section 1, is amended to read:

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Sec. 110. Department of emergency and military affairs; border security; exemption; fiscal year 2022-2023

A. The sum of \$209,205,000 is appropriated from the border security fund established by section 26-105, Arizona Revised Statutes, in fiscal year 2022-2023 to the department of emergency and military affairs. The department of emergency and military affairs shall allocate, in consultation with the department of public safety, the following amounts:

13 \$20,000,000 to Cochise county to construct a new county jail 1. facility. The monies allocated in this paragraph are intended to fund up 14 to twenty percent of the total jail facility construction cost but not to 15 16 exceed \$20,000,000. The monies allocated in this paragraph shall not be 17 distributed until Cochise county has submitted to the director of the 18 joint legislative budget committee, the director of the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting and the director of the department of 19 20 administration a report that the county has raised sufficient monies to 21 fund the remainder of the project's budget. Notwithstanding section 22 41-1252, Arizona Revised Statutes, the monies allocated in this paragraph are not subject to review by the joint committee on capital review. 23 Any 24 monies allocated pursuant to this paragraph that remain unexpended and 25 unencumbered on June 30, 2027 revert to the border security fund 26 established by section 26-105, Arizona Revised Statutes.

27 2. \$15,000,000 to reimburse a county or local law enforcement 28 agency for costs incurred by the county or local law enforcement agency 29 for participating in a program with the United States immigration and 30 customs enforcement pursuant to 8 United States code section 1357(g).

3. \$10,000,000 for deposit in the anti-human trafficking grant fund 32 established by section 26-106, Arizona Revised Statutes. The monies shall 33 be allocated as follows:

(a) \$2,000,000 to the department of public safety Arizona counter
 terrorism information center for anti-human trafficking operations that
 comply with the requirements prescribed in section 26-106, Arizona Revised
 Statutes.

(b) \$8,000,000 in award grants to city, town and county law
enforcement agencies, in an amount of not more than \$500,000 per agency,
for programs that reduce human trafficking and that comply with the
requirements prescribed in section 26-106, Arizona Revised Statutes.

42 4. \$30,000,000 to distribute to cities, towns or counties for costs 43 associated with prosecuting and imprisoning individuals charged with drug 44 trafficking, human smuggling, illegal immigration and other border-related 45 crimes. 1 5. \$10,000,000 for costs incurred by Arizona national guard assets 2 augmenting and supporting the department of public safety and local law 3 enforcement agencies relating to violations of the laws of this state in 4 the southern Arizona border region.

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\$10,000,000 for emergency health care and testing for immigrants 6. along the southern Arizona border.

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7 7. \$15,000,000 for transportation of individuals who entered 8 Arizona seeking asylum to other states in the United States, including the 9 cost of meals, onboard staffing and support.

10 8. \$53,405,000 for deputy sheriff compensation to be distributed to 11 the department of administration for the following purposes:

12 (a) \$48,310,000 to counties for the purposes of a \$10,000 onetime 13 payment to line-level deputies and detention officers employed by each 14 county sheriff's office as of May 1, 2022. The county shall distribute the payment to eligible employees in equal quarterly installments on or 15 16 before October 30, 2023. From and after April 30, 2023, a county may 17 spend monies that are unencumbered and unexpended pursuant to this 18 subdivision for the purposes prescribed by subdivision (b) of this 19 paragraph. If the amount is insufficient for a \$10,000 per employee 20 payment, the department shall distribute a prorated amount based on the 21 total number of deputies and detention officers employed. On or before 22 August 30, 2023 and August 30, 2024, each county sheriff shall submit a report to the department of administration on the actual use of the monies 23 24 received and the most recent staffing and retention data for the positions 25 receiving the payment. On or before September 30, 2023 and September 23, 26 2024, the department of administration shall submit a report to the 27 directors of the joint legislative budget committee and the governor's 28 office of strategic planning and budgeting detailing the total amounts 29 distributed by county and summarizing the individual county reports.

30 (b) \$5,095,000 to counties for the purposes of a \$5,000 onetime 31 payment to line-level deputies and detention officers hired after May 1, The county shall distribute the payment to eligible employees in 32 2022. 33 egual quarterly installments over one year. On May 1, 2022, the 34 department of administration shall distribute the monies to the counties based on the total number of vacancies for line-level deputies and 35 36 detention officers in each county as of May 1, 2022. On or before June 37 30, 2023, the department shall submit a report to the directors of the joint legislative budget committee and the governor's office of strategic 38 39 planning and budgeting detailing the amounts distributed to each county.

40 9. \$800,000 for the purposes prescribed in section 26-174, Arizona 41 Revised Statutes, regarding the established chain of command within the 42 Arizona state guard.

43 10. **\$30,000,000 \$2,322,800** for the construction costs of a state emergency operations center. Pursuant to section 41-1252, Arizona Revised 44 45 Statutes, before spending the monies allocated in this paragraph, the

1 department of emergency and military affairs shall submit for review by 2 the joint committee on capital review the scope, purpose and estimated 3 cost of the capital improvements.

4 11. \$12,232,900 TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY IN FISCAL YEAR 5 2024-2025 FOR LOCAL BORDER SUPPORT. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL USE THE MONIES 6 TO FUND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER POSITIONS FOR BORDER DRUG 7 INTERDICTION TO DETER AND APPREHEND ANY INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE CHARGED WITH 8 TRAFFICKING, HUMAN SMUGGLING, ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION DRUG AND OTHER 9 BORDER-RELATED CRIMES. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ALSO USE THE MONIES FOR GRANTS TO CITIES, TOWNS AND COUNTIES FOR COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH PROSECUTING 10 11 AND DETAINING INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE CHARGED WITH DRUG TRAFFICKING, HUMAN 12 SMUGGLING, ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION AND OTHER BORDER-RELATED CRIMES. THE 13 DEPARTMENT MAY FUND ALL CAPITAL-RELATED EQUIPMENT.

14 12. \$15,444,300 TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY IN FISCAL YEAR15 2024-2025 FOR BORDER DRUG INTERDICTION.

16 11. 13. \$15,000,000 to the department of public safety for the 17 construction costs of a southern border coordinated response center. 18 Pursuant to section 41-1252, Arizona Revised Statutes, before spending the 19 monies allocated in this paragraph, the department of public safety shall 20 submit for review by the joint committee on capital review the scope, 21 purpose and estimated cost of the capital improvements.

B. Within thirty days after the end of each calendar quarter until the monies appropriated by this section are fully expended, the department of emergency and military affairs, in consultation with the Arizona department of homeland security and the department of public safety, shall report to the joint legislative budget committee on the status of the project allocations and monies expended as prescribed by this section.

C. The department of emergency and military affairs may transfer spending authority between and within the programs and purposes listed in subsection A of this section. Before making a transfer, the department shall submit the proposed transfer to the joint legislative budget committee for review.

D. The appropriations made in subsection A of this section are exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations.

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Sec. 4. Laws 2022, chapter 313, section 128 is amended to read: Sec. 128. <u>Appropriations; additional assistance; FRPL group B</u> weight; fiscal year 2024-2025; intent

A. The sum of \$23,836,000 is appropriated from the state general fund in fiscal year 2024-2025 to the department of education for basic state aid AND A ONETIME CHARTER ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE SUPPLEMENT. The appropriated amount shall be used AS FOLLOWS:

1. \$17,978,000 SHALL BE ALLOCATED to fund an ongoing increase in
the per pupil charter additional assistance amounts prescribed in section
15-185, subsection B, paragraph 4, Arizona Revised Statutes, above the

1 amount of charter additional assistance that otherwise would be provided 2 by law for fiscal year 2024-2025.

2. \$5,858,000 SHALL BE ALLOCATED FOR A ONETIME CHARTER ADDITIONAL
ASSISTANCE SUPPLEMENT IN FISCAL YEAR 2024-2025. THE DEPARTMENT OF
EDUCATION SHALL DISTRIBUTE THE APPROPRIATED AMOUNT FOR THE ONETIME CHARTER
ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE SUPPLEMENT TO CHARTER SCHOOLS ON A PROPORTIONAL
BASIS BASED ON THE CHARTER ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE FUNDING THAT EACH CHARTER

Of the amount appropriated in the operating lump sum, \$495,853,200 19 20 \$480.658.000 is designated for personal services. \$234,006,200 21 \$227,494,000 is designated for employee-related expenditures and 22 \$15,540,500 is designated for overtime expenditures. The department shall submit an expenditure plan for review by the joint legislative budget 23 24 committee before spending these monies other than for personal services or 25 employee-related expenditures.

After the department submits an expenditure plan to the joint legislative budget committee, the department may transfer personal services and employee-related expenditures savings from the operating budget to the private prison per diem line item for private prison staff stipends. The amount of any private prison staff stipend may not exceed the amount given to department staff. The expenditure plan is not subject to review by the joint legislative budget committee.

Private prison vendors who contract with this state may use staff vacancy savings to pay for overtime costs without incurring a penalty or staffing offset.

Before placing any inmates in out-of-state provisional beds, the department shall place inmates in all available prison beds in facilities that are located in this state and that house Arizona inmates, unless the out-of-state provisional beds are of a comparable security level and price.

Payments to hospitals

The \$5,087,100 appropriation for disproportionate share payments for fiscal year 2024-2025 made pursuant to section 36-2903.01, subsection 0, Arizona Revised Statutes, includes \$4,202,300 for the Maricopa county health care district and \$884,800 for private qualifying disproportionate share hospitals.

1 Any monies received for disproportionate share hospital payments 2 from political subdivisions of this state, tribal governments and any 3 university under the jurisdiction of the Arizona board of regents, and any 4 federal monies used to match those payments, in fiscal year 2024-2025 by 5 the Arizona health care cost containment system administration in excess 6 of \$65,330,500 are appropriated to the administration in fiscal year 7 2024-2025. 22 The department of child safety shall provide training to any new 23 child safety FTE positions before assigning any client caseload duties to 24 any of these employees.

25 The legislature intends that the department of child safety use its 26 funding to achieve a one hundred percent investigation rate.

All expenditures made by the department of child safety for attorney general legal services shall be funded only from the attorney general legal services line item. Monies in department of child safety line items intended for this purpose shall be transferred to the attorney general legal services line item before expenditure.

<u>Out-of-home placements</u>

33 The department of child safety may transfer up to ten percent of the total amount of federal temporary assistance for needy families block 34 35 grant monies appropriated to the department of economic security and the 36 department of child safety to the social services block grant. Before 37 transferring federal temporary assistance for needy families block grant 38 monies to the social services block grant, the department of child safety 39 shall report the proposed amount of the transfer to the director of the 40 joint legislative budget committee. This report may be in the form of an 41 expenditure plan that is submitted at the beginning of the fiscal year and 42 updated, if necessary, throughout the fiscal year.

43 The amount appropriated for kinship care shall be used for a stipend 44 of \$300 per month for a relative caretaker, including a grandparent, any 45 level of great-grandparent or any nongrandparent relative, or a caretaker 1 of fictive kinship, if a dependent child is placed in the care of a 2 relative caretaker or caretaker of fictive kinship pursuant to department 3 guidelines. The department shall provide the stipend on behalf of all 4 children placed with an unlicensed kinship foster care parent. The 5 unlicensed kinship foster care parent is not required to file an 6 application to receive the stipend. Before changing the eligibility for 7 the program or the amount of the stipend, the department shall submit a 8 report for review by the joint legislative budget committee detailing the 9 proposed changes.

10 On or before March 31, 2025, the department of child safety shall 11 report to the joint legislative budget committee the number of children 12 who are part of the kinship stipend program and reside with a nonrelative 13 caretaker of fictive kinship.

14 <u>Support services</u>

The preventive services line item appropriation includes \$264,400 from the state general fund to draw down \$1,322,000 in additional federal monies associated with the community based child abuse prevention block grant. If grant monies are no longer available, the appropriation is reduced by the amounts of \$264,400 from the general fund and \$1,322,000 from child safety expenditure authority.

21 <u>Departmentwide</u>

The amount appropriated for any line item may not be transferred to another line item or to the operating budget unless the transfer is reviewed by the joint legislative budget committee, except that transfers between any two line items relating to the comprehensive health plan are not subject to review.

27 Child safety expenditure authority includes all department funding 28 sources excluding the state general fund, the federal child care and 29 development fund block grant, the federal temporary assistance for needy 30 families block grant, the child abuse prevention fund, the children and 31 family services training program fund and the comprehensive health plan 32 expenditure authority fund.

On or before December 1, 2024, the department of child safety shall submit a report to the joint legislative budget committee on the department's efforts to implement the family first prevention services act of 2018. The report shall quantify the department's efforts in at least the following areas, including any associated fiscal impacts:

38 1. Reducing the number of children placed for more than two weeks 39 in congregate care settings, excluding qualified residential treatment 40 programs, facilities for pregnant and parenting youth, supervised 41 independent living and specialized programs for victims of sex 42 trafficking.

26 <u>Departmentwide</u>

The above appropriations are in addition to monies granted to this state by the federal government for the same purposes but are deemed to include the sums deposited in the state treasury to the credit of the department of economic security pursuant to section 42-5029, Arizona Revised Statutes.

The department of economic security shall forward to the president 32 33 of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the 34 chairpersons of the senate and house of representatives appropriations 35 committees and the director of the joint legislative budget committee a 36 monthly report comparing total expenditures for the month and year-to-date 37 as compared to prior-year totals on or before the thirtieth of the 38 following month. Basic state aid

1 Monies derived from the permanent state school fund and any other 2 non-state general fund revenue source that is dedicated to fund basic 3 state aid shall be spent, whenever possible, before spending state general 4 fund monies.

5 Except as required by section 37-521, Arizona Revised Statutes, all 6 monies received during the fiscal year from national forests, interest 7 collected on deferred payments on the purchase of state lands, income from 8 investing permanent state school funds as prescribed by the enabling act 9 and the Constitution of Arizona and all monies received by the superintendent of public instruction from whatever source, except monies 10 11 received pursuant to sections 15-237 and 15-531, Arizona Revised Statutes, 12 when paid into the state treasury are appropriated for apportionment to 13 the various counties in accordance with law. Any monies available to the department of education pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 5, Arizona Revised Statutes, for the increased cost of basic state aid under section 15-971, Arizona Revised Statutes, due to added school days in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02, subsection A, paragraph 5, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Any monies available to the department of education from the instructional improvement fund established by section 15-979, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 15-979, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Before making any changes to the achievement testing program that will increase program costs, the department of education and the state board of education shall submit the estimated fiscal impact of those changes to the joint legislative budget committee for review.

37 Anv monies available to the department of education for accountability purposes pursuant to section 42-5029.02, subsection A, 38 39 paragraph 7, Arizona Revised Statutes, in excess of the expenditure 40 authority amounts are allocated for the purposes of section 42-5029.02, 41 subsection A, paragraph 7, Arizona Revised Statutes.

42 The department of education may use the appropriated amount for 43 accountability and achievement testing in fiscal year 2024-2025 for costs 44 of the English language proficiency assessments required by section 45 15-756.05, Arizona Revised Statutes. 1 The appropriated amount for adult education includes \$4,000,000 for 2 a onetime allocation to the continuing high school and workforce training 3 program established by section 15-217.01, Arizona Revised Statutes, 4 \$4,000,000 for a onetime deposit in the adult workforce diploma program 5 fund established by section 15-217.02, Arizona Revised Statutes, and 6 \$4,000,000 for a onetime deposit in the community college adult education 7 workforce development program fund established by section 15-217.03, 8 Arizona Revised Statutes.

The department of education shall use the appropriated amount for English learner administration to provide English language acquisition services for the purposes of section 15-756.07, Arizona Revised Statutes, and for the costs of providing English language proficiency assessments, scoring and ancillary materials as prescribed by the department of education to school districts and charter schools for the purposes of 1 title 15, chapter 7, article 3.1, Arizona Revised Statutes. The 2 department may use a portion of the appropriated amount to hire staff or 3 contract with a third party to carry out the purposes of section 15-756.07, Arizona Revised Statutes. Notwithstanding section 41-192, 4 5 Arizona Revised Statutes, the superintendent of public instruction also 6 may use a portion of the appropriated amount to contract with one or more 7 private attorneys to provide legal services in connection with the case of 8 Flores v. State of Arizona, No. CIV 92-596-TUC-RCC.

9 The department of education shall use the appropriated amount for 10 geographic literacy to issue a grant to a statewide geographic alliance 11 for strengthening geographic literacy in this state.

12 The department of education shall use the appropriated amount for 13 jobs for Arizona graduates to issue a grant to a nonprofit organization 14 for a JOBS for Arizona graduates program.

15 The department of education shall allocate the appropriated amount 16 for onetime school meal grants to school districts and charter schools 17 that participate in the national school lunch program or school breakfast 18 program established under the national school lunch and child nutrition 19 acts (42 United States Code sections 1751 through 1793) for grants to 20 reduce or eliminate copayments that would otherwise be charged to children 21 eligible for reduced-price meals. 22 The department of environmental quality shall report annually on the progress of WQARF activities, including emergency response, priority site 23 24 remediation, cost recovery activity, revenue and expenditure activity and other WQARF-funded program activity. The department shall submit the 25 26 fiscal year 2024-2025 report to the joint legislative budget committee on 27 or before September 1, 2024. This report shall also include a budget for 28 the WQARF program that is developed in consultation with the WQARF 29 advisory board. Of the \$24,514,300 appropriated to the GIITEM line item, \$12,660,400 shall be used for one hundred department of public safety GIITEM personnel. The additional staff shall include at least fifty sworn department of public safety positions to be used for immigration enforcement and border security and fifty department of public safety positions to assist GIITEM in various efforts, including:

Strictly enforcing all federal laws relating to illegal aliens
 and arresting illegal aliens.

Responding to or assisting any county sheriff or attorney in
 investigating complaints of employment of illegal aliens.

38 3. Enforcing Arizona's law known as the Legal Arizona Workers Act, 39 strictly enforcing Arizona's SB 1070, Arizona's "Support Our Law 40 Enforcement and Safe Neighborhoods Act" and investigating crimes of 41 identity theft in the context of hiring illegal aliens and the unlawful 42 entry into this country.

4. Taking strict enforcement action.

Any change in the GIITEM mission or allocation of monies shall be approved by the joint legislative budget committee. The department shall submit an expenditure plan to the joint legislative budget committee for review before expending any monies not identified in the department's previous expenditure plans.

6 Of the \$24,514,300 appropriated to the GIITEM line item, only 7 \$1,203,400 is deposited in the GIITEM fund established by section 41-1724, 8 Arizona Revised Statutes, and is appropriated for the purposes of that 9 section. The \$1,203,400 is exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, 10 Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations. This 11 state recognizes that states have inherent authority to arrest a person 12 for any immigration violation.

Any monies remaining in the department of public safety joint account on June 30, 2025 revert to the funds from which they were appropriated. The reverted monies shall be returned in direct proportion to the amounts appropriated.

17 On or before September 1, 2024, the department of public safety 18 shall submit an expenditure plan for the local border support line item to 19 the joint legislative budget committee and the governor's office of 20 strategic planning and budgeting.

21 The \$5,000,000 appropriated for the local border support line item 22 shall be used to fund local law enforcement officer positions for border drug interdiction to deter and apprehend any individuals who are charged 23 24 with drug trafficking, human smuggling, illegal immigration and other 25 border-related crimes. The monies shall also be used for grants to 26 cities, towns and counties for costs associated with prosecuting and 27 detaining individuals who are charged with drug trafficking, human 28 smuggling, illegal immigration and other border-related crimes. The 29 department may fund all capital-related equipment.

Of the amount appropriated in the total appropriation for the department of public safety, \$180,608,800 is designated for personal services and \$72,235,200 is designated for employee-related expenditures. The department shall submit an expenditure plan to the joint legislative budget committee for review before spending these monies for other than personal services or employee-related expenditures.

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1 Within forty-five days after the last day of each calendar Β. 2 quarter through June 30, 2027, the superintendent of public instruction 3 shall report to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of 4 the chairpersons of the senate representatives, and house of 5 representatives appropriations committees and the director of the joint 6 legislative budget committee the total planned allocations and actual 7 expenditures of monies allocated to the superintendent of public 8 instruction from the elementary and secondary school emergency relief fund 9 as appropriated by section 2001 of the American rescue plan act of 2021 10 (P.L. 117-2).

11 C. Reports required pursuant to this section shall delineate 12 expenditures by agency and program and include descriptions of the purpose 13 of the expenditures.

14 D. The legislature intends that the executive branch of state 15 government report on its planned and actual use of any major additional 16 federal aid to this state through federal legislation enacted by the end 17 of fiscal year 2024-2025. The timing and frequency of these reports 18 should be the same as required by subsections A and B of this section. 19 The chairperson and vice chairperson of the joint legislative budget 20 committee may provide recommendations to the executive branch concerning 21 federal legislation that would qualify under this subsection.

Sec. 149. Legislative intent; expenditure reporting

23 The legislature intends that all departments, agencies and budget 24 units receiving appropriations under the terms of this act continue to 25 report actual, estimated and requested expenditures by budget programs and 26 budget classes in a format that is similar to the budget programs and 27 budget classes used for budgetary purposes in prior years. A different 28 format may be used if deemed necessary to implement section 35-113, 29 Arizona Revised Statutes, agreed to by the director of the joint 30 legislative budget committee and incorporated into the budget preparation 31 instructions adopted by the governor's office of strategic planning and 32 budgeting pursuant to section 35-112, Arizona Revised Statutes.

Sec. 150. FTE positions; reporting; definition

34 Full-time equivalent (FTE) positions contained in this act are 35 subject to appropriation. The director of the department of 36 administration shall account for the use of a]] appropriated and 37 nonappropriated FTE positions, excluding those in the universities. The director of the department of administration shall submit the fiscal year 38 39 2024-2025 report on or before October 1, 2025 to the director of the joint 40 legislative budget committee. The report shall compare the level of 41 appropriated FTE usage in each fiscal year to the appropriated level. For the purposes of this section, "FTE positions" means the total number of 42 43 hours worked, including both regular and overtime hours as well as hours 44 taken as leave, divided by the number of hours in a work year. The 45 director of the department of administration shall notify the director of

1 a budget unit if the budget unit's appropriated FTE usage has exceeded its 2 number of appropriated FTE positions. Each university shall report to the 3 director of the joint legislative budget committee in a manner comparable 4 to the department of administration reporting.

5 6 Sec. 151. Privately funded FTE positions; reporting; definition

7 A. On or before October 31 in 2024 and 2025, each budget unit of 8 this state shall submit a report to the staff of the joint legislative 9 budget committee and the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting if the budget unit had any privately funded employees in fiscal 10 11 year 2023-2024 or 2024-2025. The report shall include the title, duties 12 and salary compensation of each privately funded employee.

13 B. For the purposes of this section, "privately funded" means 14 salary compensation paid for in whole or in part with monies from sources other than this state, a political subdivision of this state or the 15 16 federal government.

Sec. 152. Filled FTE positions; reporting

18 On or before October 1, 2024, each agency, including the judiciary 19 and universities, shall submit a report to the director of the joint 20 legislative budget committee on the number of filled appropriated and 21 nonappropriated FTE positions, by fund source, as of September 1, 2024. 22

Sec. 153. Transfer of spending authority

23 The department of administration shall report monthly to the 24 director of the joint legislative budget committee any transfers of spending authority made pursuant to section 35-173, subsection C, Arizona 25 26 Revised Statutes, during the prior month.

Sec. 154. Interim reporting requirements

A. State general fund revenue for fiscal year 2023-2024, including 28 29 a beginning balance of \$2,527,200,000 and other onetime revenues, is forecasted to be \$17,786,100,000. 30

31 State general fund revenue for fiscal year 2024-2025, including Β. 32 onetime revenues, is forecasted to be \$16,282,100,000.

33 C. State general fund revenue for fiscal year 2025-2026, including onetime revenues, is forecasted to be \$16,467,300,000. State general fund 34 35 expenditures for fiscal year 2025-2026 are forecasted to be 36 \$16,439,600,000.

37 D. State general fund revenue for fiscal year 2026-2027, including 38 onetime revenues, is forecasted to be \$17,146,700,000. State general fund 39 expenditures for fiscal year 2026-2027 are forecasted to be 40 \$17,131,600,000.

1 E. On or before September 15, 2024, the executive branch shall 2 provide to the joint legislative budget committee a preliminary estimate 3 of the fiscal year 2023-2024 state general fund ending balance. The 4 estimate shall include projections of total revenues, total expenditures 5 and an ending balance. The department of administration shall continue to 6 provide the final report for the fiscal year in its annual financial 7 report pursuant to section 35-131, Arizona Revised Statutes.

8 F. Based on the information provided by the executive branch, the 9 staff of the joint legislative budget committee shall report to the joint legislative budget committee on or before October 15, 2024 whether the 10 11 fiscal year 2024-2025 revenues and ending balance are expected to change 12 by more than \$50,000,000 from the budgeted projections. The joint 13 legislative budget committee staff may make technical adjustments to the 14 revenue and expenditure estimates in this section to reflect other bills enacted into law. The executive branch may also provide its own estimates 15 16 to the joint legislative budget committee on or before October 15, 2024.

Sec. 155. Definition

18 For the purposes of this act, "*" means this appropriation is a 19 continuing appropriation and is exempt from the provisions of section 20 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations. 21

Sec. 156. Definition

22 For the purposes of this act, "expenditure authority" means that the 23 fund sources are continuously appropriated monies that are included in the 24 individual line items of appropriations.

25

Sec. 157. Definition

26 For the purposes of this act, "review by the joint legislative 27 budget committee" means a review by a vote of a majority of a quorum of the members of the joint legislative budget committee. 28
