AMENDING SECTIONS 15-808 AND 15-901, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO SCHOOL FINANCE.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Section 15-808, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 3 read: 4 15-808. Arizona online instruction; reports; definitions 5 A. Arizona online instruction shall be instituted to meet the needs 6 of pupils in the information age. The state board of education shall 7 select district public schools and state-approved charter authorizers 8 shall sponsor charter schools to be online course providers or online 9 schools. The state board of education and state-approved charter 10 authorizers shall develop standards for the approval of online course 11 providers and online schools based on the following criteria: 12 1. The depth and breadth of curriculum choices. 13 2. The variety of educational methodologies employed by the school and the means of addressing the unique needs and learning styles of 14 targeted pupil populations, including computer-assisted learning systems, 15 16 virtual classrooms, virtual laboratories, electronic field trips, e-mail 17 EMAIL, virtual tutoring, online help desk, group chat sessions and 18 noncomputer-based activities performed under the direction of а 19 certificated teacher. 20 3. The availability of an intranet or private network to safeguard 21 pupils against predatory and pornographic elements of the internet. 22 4. The availability of filtered research access to the internet. 23 5. The availability of private individual e-mail EMAIL between 24 pupils, teachers, administrators and parents in order to protect the 25 confidentiality of pupil records and information. 26 6. The availability of faculty members who are experienced with 27 computer networks, the internet and computer animation. 7. The extent to which the school intends to develop partnerships 28 29 with universities, community colleges and private businesses. 30 8. The services offered to populations with developmental disabilities. 31 9. The grade levels that will be served. 32 B. Each new school that provides online instruction shall provide 33 online instruction on a probationary status. After a new school that 34 35 provides online instruction has clearly demonstrated the academic 36 integrity of its instruction through the actual improvement of the 37 academic performance of its students, the school may apply to be removed status. The state 38 probationary board of education or the from state-approved charter authorizer that sponsored the charter school shall 39 40 remove from Arizona online instruction any probationary school that fails 41 to clearly demonstrate improvement in academic performance within three 42 years measured against goals in the approved application and the state's 43 accountability system. All pupils who participate in Arizona online instruction shall reside in this state. Pupils who participate in Arizona 44 45 online instruction are subject to the testing requirements prescribed in 1 chapter 7, article 3 of this title. On enrollment, the school shall 2 notify the parents or guardians of the pupil of the state testing 3 requirements. If a pupil fails to comply with the testing requirements 4 and the school administers the tests pursuant to this subsection to less 5 than ninety-five percent of the pupils in Arizona online instruction, the 6 pupil shall not be allowed to participate in Arizona online instruction.

7 C. The state board of education and state-approved charter 8 authorizers shall develop annual reporting mechanisms for schools that 9 participate in Arizona online instruction.

D. The department of education shall compile the information submitted in the annual reports by schools participating in Arizona online instruction. The department of education shall submit the compiled report to the governor, the speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the senate by November 15 of each year.

E. Each school selected for Arizona online instruction shall ensure 15 16 that a daily log is maintained for each pupil who participates in Arizona 17 online instruction. The daily log shall describe the amount of time spent 18 by each pupil participating in Arizona online instruction pursuant to this section on academic tasks. The daily log shall be used by the school 19 20 district or charter school to qualify the pupils who participate in 21 Arizona online instruction in the school's average daily attendance 22 calculations pursuant to subsection F of this section.

23 F. If a pupil is enrolled in a school district or charter school 24 and also participates in Arizona online instruction, the sum of the average daily membership, which includes enrollment as prescribed in 25 26 section 15-901, subsection A, paragraph 1, subdivisions (a) and (b) and daily attendance as prescribed in section 15-901, subsection A, paragraph 27 5, for that pupil in the school district or charter school and in Arizona 28 29 online instruction shall not exceed 1.0. If the pupil is enrolled in a school district or a charter school and also participates in Arizona 30 31 online instruction and the sum of the daily membership or daily attendance for that pupil is greater than 1.0, the sum shall be reduced to 1.0 and 32 33 shall be apportioned between the school district, unless the school 34 district is a career technical education district subject to the 35 apportionment requirements of section 15-393, or charter school and 36 Arizona online instruction based on the percentage of total time that the pupil is enrolled or in attendance in the school district or charter 37 38 school and Arizona online instruction. The uniform system of financial 39 records shall include guidelines for the apportionment of the pupil 40 enrollment and attendance as provided in this subsection. Pupils in 41 Arizona online instruction do not incur absences for purposes of this 42 subsection and may generate an average daily attendance of 1.0 for 43 attendance hours during any hour of the day, during any day of the week and at any time between July 1 and June 30 of each fiscal year. For 44 45 kindergarten programs and grades one through eight, average daily

1 membership shall be calculated by dividing the instructional hours as 2 reported in the daily log required in subsection E of this section by the 3 applicable hourly requirements prescribed in section 15-901. For grades 4 nine through twelve, average daily membership shall be calculated by 5 dividing the instructional hours as reported in the daily log required in 6 subsection E of this section by nine hundred. The average daily 7 membership of a pupil who participates in online instruction shall not 8 exceed 1.0. Average daily membership shall not be calculated on the one 9 hundredth day of instruction for the purposes of this section. Funding 10 shall be determined as follows:

11 1. A pupil who is enrolled full-time FULL TIME in Arizona online 12 instruction shall be funded for online instruction at ninety-five percent 13 of the base support level that would be calculated for that pupil if that pupil were enrolled as a full-time student in a school district or charter 14 school that does not participate in Arizona online instruction. Charter 15 16 additional assistance and district additional assistance shall be 17 calculated in the same manner they would be calculated if the student were 18 enrolled in a district or charter school that does not participate in 19 Arizona online instruction.

20 2. A pupil who is enrolled part-time PART TIME in Arizona online 21 instruction shall be funded for online instruction at eighty-five percent 22 of the base support level that would be calculated for that pupil if that pupil were enrolled as a part-time student in a school district or charter 23 24 school that does not participate in Arizona online instruction. Charter 25 assistance and district additional assistance shall additional be 26 calculated in the same manner they would be calculated if the student were 27 enrolled in a district or charter school that does not participate in 28 Arizona online instruction.

G. If the academic achievement of a pupil declines while the pupil participating in Arizona online instruction, the pupil's parents, the pupil's teachers and the principal or head teacher of the school shall confer to evaluate whether the pupil should be allowed to continue to participate in Arizona online instruction.

H. To ensure the academic integrity of pupils who participate in online instruction, Arizona online instruction shall include multiple diverse assessment measures and the proctored administration of required state standardized tests.

I. A school district or charter school may not charge a fee to a 38 pupil who takes an examination in a particular course to obtain academic 39 40 credit, pursuant to section 15-701.01, subsection I, from the school 41 district or charter school if the academic credit for a course was 42 previously earned in an Arizona online instruction course or at any public 43 school in this state. Any test administered pursuant to this subsection shall be an assessment that is aligned to the course-relevant state 44 45 academic standards.

1 2 J. For the purposes of this section:

1. "Full-time student" means:

3 (a) A student who is at least five years of age before September 1 4 of a school year and who is enrolled EITHER:

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(i) In a school HALF-DAY kindergarten program that meets at least 6 three hundred forty-six hours during the school year.

7 (ii) IN A SCHOOL FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM THAT MEETS AT LEAST 8 SEVEN HUNDRED TWELVE HOURS DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR.

9 (b) A student who is at least six years of age before September 1 of a school year, who has not graduated from the highest grade taught in 10 11 the school and who is regularly enrolled in a course of study required by the state board of education. For first, second and third grade students, 12 13 the instructional program shall meet at least seven hundred twelve hours DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR. For fourth, fifth and sixth grade students, the 14 15 instructional program shall meet at least eight hundred ninety hours 16 during the school year.

17 (c) Seventh and eighth grade students or ungraded students who are 18 at least twelve, but under fourteen, years of age on or before September 1 and who are enrolled in an instructional program of courses that meets at 19 20 least one thousand sixty-eight hours during the school year.

21 (d) For high schools, a student who has not graduated from the 22 highest grade taught in the school district, or an ungraded student who is 23 at least fourteen years of age on or before September 1, and who is 24 enrolled in at least four courses throughout the year that meet at least nine hundred hours during the school year. A full-time student shall not 25 26 be counted more than once for computation of average daily membership.

"Online course provider" means a school other than an online 27 2. 28 is selected by the state board of education school that or а 29 state-approved charter authorizer to participate in Arizona online instruction pursuant to this section and that provides at least one online 30 31 academic course that is approved by the state board of education.

3. "Online school" means a school that provides at least four 32 online academic courses or one or more online courses for the equivalent 33 of at least five hours each day for one hundred eighty school days and 34 35 that is a charter school that is sponsored by a state-approved charter 36 authorizer or a district public school that is selected by the state board 37 of education to participate in Arizona online instruction.

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4. "Part-time student" means:

39 (a) Any student who is enrolled in a program that does not meet the 40 definition in paragraph 1 of this subsection shall be funded at 41 eighty-five percent of the base support level that would be calculated for 42 that pupil if that pupil were enrolled as a part-time student in a school 43 district or charter school that does not participate in Arizona online 44 instruction.

1 (b) A part-time student of seventy-five percent average daily 2 membership shall be enrolled in at least three subjects throughout the 3 year that offer for first, second and third grade students at least five 4 hundred thirty-four instructional hours in a school year and for fourth, 5 fifth and sixth grade students at least six hundred sixty-eight 6 instructional hours in a school year. A part-time student of fifty 7 percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least two 8 subjects throughout the year that offer for first, second and third grade 9 students at least three hundred fifty-six instructional hours in a school 10 year and for fourth, fifth and sixth grade students at least four hundred 11 forty-five instructional hours in a school year. A part-time student of 12 twenty-five percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least 13 one subject throughout the year that offers for first, second and third 14 grade students at least one hundred seventy-eight instructional hours in a school year and for fourth, fifth and sixth grade students at least two 15 16 hundred twenty-three instructional hours in a school year.

17 (c) For seventh and eighth grade students, a part-time student of 18 seventy-five percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least three subjects throughout the year that offer at least eight hundred 19 20 one instructional hours in a school year. A part-time student of fifty 21 percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least two 22 subjects throughout the year that offer at least five hundred thirty-four 23 instructional hours in a school year. A part-time student of twenty-five 24 percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least one subject 25 throughout the year that offers at least two hundred sixty-seven 26 instructional hours in a school year.

27 (d) For high school students, a part-time student of seventy-five percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least three 28 29 subjects throughout the year that offer at least six hundred seventy-five 30 instructional hours in a school year. A part-time student of fifty 31 percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least two 32 subjects throughout the year that offer at least four hundred fifty 33 instructional hours in a school year. A part-time student of twenty-five 34 percent average daily membership shall be enrolled in at least one subject 35 throughout the year that offers at least two hundred twenty-five 36 instructional hours in a school year.

37 5. "State-approved charter authorizer" means any charter school
 38 sponsor authorized pursuant to section 15-183.

39 Sec. 2. Section 15-901, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 40 read:

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15-901. <u>Definitions</u>

A. In this title, unless the context otherwise requires:

43 1. "Average daily membership" means the total enrollment of 44 fractional students and full-time students, minus withdrawals, of each 45 school day through the first one hundred days or two hundred days in

1 session, as applicable, for the current year. For the purposes of this 2 paragraph, "withdrawals" means students who are formally withdrawn from 3 schools or students who are absent for ten consecutive school days, except for excused absences identified by the department of education. 4 For 5 computation purposes, a student who is absent for nine or fewer 6 consecutive school days, including the last day of the school year, is not 7 a withdrawal and may not be subtracted from the total enrollment of 8 fractional students and full-time students. For the purposes of this 9 section, school districts and charter schools shall report student absence data to the department of education at least once every sixty days in 10 11 session. For computation purposes, the effective date of withdrawal shall 12 be retroactive to the last day of actual attendance of the student or 13 excused absence. A school district or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours requirements prescribed in this subsection in any 14 manner prescribed in the school district's or charter school's 15 16 instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08.

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(a) "Fractional student" means:

18 (i) For common schools, a preschool child who is enrolled in a program for preschool children with disabilities of at least three hundred 19 20 sixty minutes each week that meets at least two hundred sixteen hours over 21 the minimum number of days or a kindergarten student who is at least five 22 years of age before January 1 of the school year and enrolled in a school HALF-DAY kindergarten program that meets at least three hundred fifty-six 23 24 hours AND FEWER THAN SEVEN HUNDRED TWELVE HOURS for a one hundred eighty-day school year, or the instructional hours prescribed in this 25 26 section. In computing the average daily membership, preschool children with disabilities and HALF-DAY kindergarten students shall be counted as 27 one-half of a full-time student. For common schools, a part-time student 28 29 is a student enrolled for less than the total time for a full-time student as defined in this section. A part-time common school student shall be 30 31 counted as one-fourth, one-half or three-fourths of a full-time student if the student is enrolled in an instructional program that is at least 32 one-fourth, one-half or three-fourths of the time a full-time student is 33 enrolled as defined in subdivision (b) of this paragraph. 34 The hours in 35 which a student is scheduled to attend a common school during the regular 36 school day shall be included in the calculation of the average daily 37 membership for that student.

(ii) For high schools, a part-time student who is enrolled in less 38 39 than four subjects that count toward graduation as defined by the state 40 board of education, each of which, if taught each school day for the 41 minimum number of days required in a school year, would meet a minimum of 42 one hundred twenty-three hours a year, or the equivalent, in a recognized 43 high school. The average daily membership of a part-time high school student shall be 0.75 if the student is enrolled in an instructional 44 45 program of three subjects that meet at least five hundred forty hours for

1 one hundred eighty-day school year, or the instructional hours а 2 prescribed in this section. The average daily membership of a part-time 3 high school student shall be 0.5 if the student is enrolled in an 4 instructional program of two subjects that meet at least three hundred 5 sixty hours for a one hundred eighty-day school year, or the instructional 6 hours prescribed in this section. The average daily membership of a 7 part-time high school student shall be 0.25 if the student is enrolled in 8 an instructional program of one subject that meets at least one hundred 9 one hundred eighty-day school eighty hours for а year, or the instructional hours prescribed in this section. The hours in which a 10 11 student is scheduled to attend a high school during the regular school day 12 shall be included in the calculation of the average daily membership for 13 that student.

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(b) "Full-time student" means:

(i) For common schools, a student who is at least six FIVE years of 15 16 age before January 1 of a school year, who has not graduated from the 17 highest grade taught in the school district and who is regularly enrolled 18 in a SCHOOL FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM OR A course of study required by the state board of education. FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN STUDENTS, first, 19 20 second and third grade students or ungraded group B children with 21 disabilities who are at least five, but under six, years of age by 22 September 1 must be enrolled in an instructional program that meets for a total of at least seven hundred twelve hours for a one hundred eighty-day 23 24 school year, or the instructional hours prescribed in this section. Fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade students must be enrolled 25 26 in an instructional program that meets for a total of at least eight 27 hundred ninety hours for a one hundred eighty-day school year, or the instructional hours prescribed in this section, including the equivalent 28 29 number of instructional hours for schools that operate on a one hundred forty-four-day school year. The hours in which a student is scheduled to 30 31 attend a common school during the regular school day shall be included in the calculation of the average daily membership for that student. 32

(ii) For high schools, a student who has not graduated from the 33 highest grade taught in the school district and who is enrolled in at 34 35 least an instructional program of four or more subjects that count toward 36 graduation as defined by the state board of education, each of which, if 37 taught each school day for the minimum number of days required in a school year, would meet a minimum of one hundred twenty-three hours a year, or 38 the equivalent, that meets for a total of at least seven hundred twenty 39 40 hours for a one hundred eighty-day school year, or the instructional hours 41 prescribed in this section in a recognized high school. A full-time student shall not be counted more than once for computation of average 42 43 daily membership. The average daily membership of a full-time high school student shall be 1.0 if the student is enrolled in at least four subjects 44 45 that meet at least seven hundred twenty hours for a one hundred eighty-day 1 school year, or the equivalent instructional hours prescribed in this 2 section. The hours in which a student is scheduled to attend a high 3 school during the regular school day shall be included in the calculation 4 of the average daily membership for that student.

5 (iii) If a child who has not reached five years of age before 6 September 1 of the current school year is admitted to kindergarten and 7 repeats kindergarten in the following school year, a school district or 8 charter school is not eligible to receive basic state aid on behalf of 9 that child during the child's second year of kindergarten. If a child who has not reached five years of age before September 1 of the current school 10 11 year is admitted to kindergarten but does not remain enrolled, a school 12 district or charter school may receive a portion of basic state aid on 13 behalf of that child in the subsequent year. A school district or charter school may charge tuition for any child who is ineligible for basic state 14 15 aid pursuant to this item.

16 (iv) Except as otherwise provided by law, for a full-time high 17 school student who is concurrently enrolled in two school districts or two 18 charter schools, the average daily membership shall not exceed 1.0.

(v) Except as otherwise provided by law, for any student who is concurrently enrolled in a school district and a charter school, the average daily membership shall be apportioned between the school district and the charter school and shall not exceed 1.0. The apportionment shall be based on the percentage of total time that the student is enrolled in or in attendance at the school district and the charter school.

25 (vi) Except as otherwise provided by law, for any student who is 26 concurrently enrolled, pursuant to section 15-808, in a school district 27 and Arizona online instruction or a charter school and Arizona online 28 instruction, the average daily membership shall be apportioned between the 29 school district and Arizona online instruction or the charter school and Arizona online instruction and shall not exceed 1.0. The apportionment 30 31 shall be based on the percentage of total time that the student is enrolled in or in attendance at the school district and Arizona online 32 33 instruction or the charter school and Arizona online instruction.

34 (vii) For homebound or hospitalized, a student receiving at least 35 four hours of instruction per week.

36 (c) "Regular school day" means the regularly scheduled class 37 periods intended for instructional purposes. Instructional purposes may 38 include core subjects, elective subjects, lunch, study halls, music 39 instruction and other classes that advance the academic instruction of 40 pupils. Instructional purposes do not include athletic practices or 41 extracurricular clubs and activities.

42 2. "Budget year" means the fiscal year for which the school43 district is budgeting and that immediately follows the current year.

1 3. "Common school district" means a political subdivision of this 2 state offering instruction to students in programs for preschool children 3 with disabilities and kindergarten programs and either:

4

(a) Grades one through eight.

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(b) Grades one through nine pursuant to section 15-447.01.

6 4. "Current year" means the fiscal year in which a school district 7 is operating.

8 9 5. "Daily attendance" means:

(a) For common schools, days in which a pupil:

(i) Of a kindergarten program or ungraded, but not group B children 10 11 with disabilities, who is at least five, but under six, years of age by 12 September 1 attends at least three-quarters of the instructional time 13 scheduled for the day. If the total instruction time scheduled for the year is at least three hundred fifty-six hours but is less than seven 14 hundred twelve hours, such attendance shall be counted as one-half day of 15 16 attendance. If the instructional time scheduled for the year is at least 17 six hundred ninety-two hours, "daily attendance" means days in which a 18 pupil attends at least one-half of the instructional time scheduled for the day. Such attendance shall be counted as one-half day of attendance. 19 20 A school district or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours 21 requirements prescribed in this item in any manner prescribed in the 22 school district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08. 23

(ii) Of the first, second or third grades attends more than three-quarters of the instructional time scheduled for the day. A school district or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours requirements prescribed in this item in any manner prescribed in the school district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08.

30 (iii) Of the fourth, fifth or sixth grades attends more than 31 three-quarters of the instructional time scheduled for the day, except as 32 provided in section 15-797. A school district or charter school may 33 satisfy any of the time and hours requirements prescribed in this item in 34 any manner prescribed in the school district's or charter school's 35 instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08.

36 (iv) Of the seventh or eighth grades attends more than 37 three-quarters of the instructional time scheduled for the day, except as provided in section 15–797. A school district or charter school may 38 39 satisfy any of the time and hours requirements prescribed in this item in 40 any manner prescribed in the school district's or charter school's 41 instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08.

42 (b) For common schools, the attendance of a pupil at three-quarters 43 or less of the instructional time scheduled for the day shall be counted 44 as follows, except as provided in section 15-797 and except that 1 attendance for a fractional student shall not exceed the pupil's 2 fractional membership:

3 (i) If attendance for all pupils in the school is based on quarter 4 days, the attendance of a pupil shall be counted as one-fourth of a day's 5 attendance for each one-fourth of full-time instructional time attended. 6 A school district or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours 7 requirements prescribed in this item in any manner prescribed in the 8 school district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted 9 under section 15-901.08.

10 (ii) If attendance for all pupils in the school is based on half 11 days, the attendance of at least three-quarters of the instructional time scheduled for the day shall be counted as a full day's attendance and 12 13 attendance at a minimum of one-half but less than three-quarters of the instructional time scheduled for the day 14 equals one-half day of A school district or charter school may satisfy any of the 15 attendance. 16 time and hours requirements prescribed in this item in any manner 17 prescribed in the school district's or charter school's instructional time 18 model adopted under section 15-901.08.

19 (c) For common schools, the attendance of a preschool child with 20 disabilities shall be counted as one-fourth day's attendance for each 21 thirty-six minutes of attendance, except as provided in paragraph 1, 22 subdivision (a), item (i) of this subsection for children with disabilities up to a maximum of three hundred sixty minutes each week. A 23 24 school district or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours 25 requirements prescribed in this subdivision in any manner prescribed in 26 the school district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted 27 under section 15-901.08.

(d) For high schools, the attendance of a pupil shall not be 28 29 counted as a full day unless the pupil is actually and physically in attendance and enrolled in and carrying four subjects, each of which, if 30 31 taught each school day for the minimum number of days required in a school year, would meet a minimum of one hundred twenty-three hours a year, or 32 the equivalent, that count toward graduation in a recognized high school 33 except as provided in section 15-797 and subdivision (e) of this 34 Attendance of a pupil carrying less than the load prescribed 35 paragraph. 36 shall be prorated. A school district or charter school may satisfy any of 37 the time and hours requirements prescribed in this subdivision in any prescribed 38 manner in the school district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08. 39

40 (e) For high schools, the attendance of a pupil may be counted as 41 one-fourth of a day's attendance for each sixty minutes of instructional 42 time in a subject that counts toward graduation, except that attendance 43 for a pupil shall not exceed the pupil's full or fractional membership. A 44 school district or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours 45 requirements prescribed in this subdivision in any manner prescribed in 1 the school district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted 2 under section 15-901.08.

3 (f) For homebound or hospitalized, a full day of attendance may be 4 counted for each day during a week in which the student receives at least 5 four hours of instruction. A school district or charter school may 6 satisfy any of the time and hours requirements prescribed in this 7 subdivision in any manner prescribed in the school district's or charter 8 school's instructional time model adopted under section 15-901.08.

9 (g) For school districts that maintain school for an approved year-round school year operation, attendance shall be based on a 10 11 computation, as prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction, of 12 the one hundred eighty days' equivalency or two hundred days' equivalency, 13 as applicable, of instructional time as approved by the superintendent of public instruction during which each pupil is enrolled. A school district 14 or charter school may satisfy any of the time and hours requirements 15 16 prescribed in this subdivision in any manner prescribed in the school 17 district's or charter school's instructional time model adopted under 18 section 15-901.08.

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6. "Daily route mileage" means the sum of:

(a) The total number of miles driven daily by all buses of a school
 district while transporting eligible students from their residence to the
 school of attendance and from the school of attendance to their residence
 on scheduled routes approved by the superintendent of public instruction.

24 (b) The total number of miles driven daily on routes approved by 25 the superintendent of public instruction for which a private party, a 26 political subdivision or a common or a contract carrier is reimbursed for bringing an eligible student from the place of the student's residence to 27 a school transportation pickup point or to the school of attendance and 28 29 from the school transportation scheduled return point or from the school of attendance to the student's residence. Daily route mileage includes 30 31 the total number of miles necessary to drive to transport eligible 32 students from and to their residence as provided in this paragraph.

7. "District support level" means the base support level plus thetransportation support level.

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8. "Eligible students" means:

36 (a) Students who are transported by or for a school district and
 37 who qualify as full-time students or fractional students, except students
 38 for whom transportation is paid by another school district or a county
 39 school superintendent, and:

40 (i) For common school students, whose place of actual residence 41 within the school district is more than one mile from the school facility 42 of attendance or students who are admitted pursuant to section 15-816.01 43 and who meet the economic eligibility requirements established under the 44 national school lunch and child nutrition acts (42 United States Code 45 sections 1751 through 1793) for free or reduced-price lunches and whose 1 actual place of residence outside the school district boundaries is more 2 than one mile from the school facility of attendance.

3 (ii) For high school students, whose place of actual residence 4 within the school district is more than one and one-half miles from the 5 school facility of attendance or students who are admitted pursuant to 6 section 15-816.01 and who meet the economic eligibility requirements 7 established under the national school lunch and child nutrition acts 8 (42 United States Code sections 1751 through 1793) for free or 9 reduced-price lunches and whose actual place of residence outside the school district boundaries is more than one and one-half miles from the 10 11 school facility of attendance.

(b) Kindergarten students, for purposes of computing the number of eligible students under subdivision (a), item (i) of this paragraph, shall be counted as full-time students, notwithstanding any other provision of law.

16 (c) Children with disabilities, as defined by section 15-761, who 17 are transported by or for the school district or who are admitted pursuant 18 to chapter 8, article 1.1 of this title and who qualify as full-time 19 students or fractional students regardless of location or residence within 20 the school district or children with disabilities whose transportation is 21 required by the pupil's individualized education program.

(d) Students whose residence is outside the school district and who
are transported within the school district on the same basis as students
who reside in the school district.

9. "Enrolled" or "enrollment" means that a pupil is currently
registered in the school district.

10. "GDP price deflator" means the average of the four implicit
 price deflators for the gross domestic product reported by the United
 States department of commerce for the four quarters of the calendar year.

11. "High school district" means a political subdivision of this state offering instruction to students for grades nine through twelve or that portion of the budget of a common school district that is allocated to teaching high school subjects with permission of the state board of education.

35 12. "Instructional hours" or "instructional time" means hours or 36 time spent pursuant to an instructional time model adopted under section 37 15-901.08.

38 13. "Revenue control limit" means the base revenue control limit 39 plus the transportation revenue control limit.

40 14. "Student count" means average daily membership as prescribed in 41 this subsection for the fiscal year before the current year, except that 42 for the purpose of budget preparation student count means average daily 43 membership as prescribed in this subsection for the current year.

44 15. "Submit electronically" means submitted in a format and in a 45 manner prescribed by the department of education.

1 16. "Total bus mileage" means the total number of miles driven by 2 all buses of a school district during the school year. 3 17. "Total students transported" means all eligible students 4 transported from their place of residence to a school transportation 5 pickup point or to the school of attendance and from the school of 6 attendance or from the school transportation scheduled return point to 7 their place of residence. 8 18. "Unified school district" means a political subdivision of this 9 state offering instruction to students in programs for preschool children with disabilities and kindergarten programs and grades one through twelve. 10 11 B. In this title, unless the context otherwise requires: 12 "Base" means the revenue level per student count specified by 1. the legislature. 13 14 "Base level" means the following amounts plus the percentage 2. increase to the base level as provided in section 15-902.04: 15 16 (a) For fiscal year 2021-2022, \$4,390.65. 17 (b) For fiscal year 2022-2023, \$4,775.27. 18 (c) For fiscal year 2023-2024, \$4,914.71. 19 3. "Base revenue control limit" means the base revenue control 20 limit computed as provided in section 15-944. 21 4. "Base support level" means the base support level as provided in 22 section 15-943. 5. "Certified teacher" means a person who is certified as a teacher 23 24 pursuant to the rules adopted by the state board of education, who renders direct and personal services to schoolchildren in the form of instruction 25 26 related to the school district's educational course of study and who is 27 paid from the maintenance and operation section of the budget. 6. "DD" means programs for children with developmental delays who 28 29 are at least three years of age but under ten years of age. A preschool child who is categorized under this paragraph is not eligible to receive 30 31 funding pursuant to section 15-943, paragraph 2, subdivision (b). 32 7. "ED, MIID, SLD, SLI and OHI" means programs for children with 33 emotional disabilities, mild intellectual disabilities, a specific learning disability, a speech/language impairment and other health 34 impairments. A preschool child who is categorized as SLI under this 35 36 paragraph is not eligible to receive funding pursuant to section 15-943, 37 paragraph 2, subdivision (b). 8. "ED-P" means programs for children with emotional disabilities 38 who are enrolled in private special education programs as prescribed in 39 40 section 15–765, subsection D, paragraph 1 or in an intensive school 41 district program as provided in section 15-765, subsection D, paragraph 2. 9. "ELL" means English learners who do not speak English or whose 42 43 native language is not English, who are not currently able to perform ordinary classroom work in English and who are enrolled in an English 44 45 language education program pursuant to sections 15-751, 15-752 and 15-753.

1 10. "FRPL" means students who meet the eligibility requirements 2 established under the national school lunch and child nutrition acts 3 (42 United States Code sections 1751 through 1793) for free or 4 lunches, equivalent measure recognized reduced-price or an for 5 participating in the federal free and reduced-price lunch program and 6 other school programs dependent on a poverty measure, including the 7 community eligibility provision for which free and reduced-price lunch 8 data is not available.

9 11. "Full-time equivalent certified teacher" or "FTE certified 10 teacher" means for a certified teacher the following:

(a) If employed full time as defined in section 15-501, 1.00.

(b) If employed less than full time, multiply 1.00 by the percentage of a full school day, or its equivalent, or a full class load, or its equivalent, for which the teacher is employed as determined by the governing board.

16 12. "G" means educational programs for gifted pupils who score at 17 or above the ninety-seventh percentile, based on national norms, on a test 18 adopted by the state board of education.

19 13. "Group A" means educational programs for career exploration, a 20 specific learning disability, an emotional disability, a mild intellectual 21 disability, remedial education, a speech/language impairment, 22 developmental delay, homebound pupils, bilingual pupils and pupils with 23 other health impairments.

24 14. "Group B" means educational improvements for pupils in 25 kindergarten programs and grades one through three, educational programs 26 for autism, a hearing impairment, a moderate intellectual disability, 27 multiple disabilities, multiple disabilities with severe sensory impairment, orthopedic impairments, preschool severe delay, a severe 28 29 intellectual disability and emotional disabilities for school age pupils enrolled in private special education programs or in school district 30 31 programs for children with severe disabilities or visual impairment, 32 English learners enrolled in a program to promote English language 33 proficiency pursuant to section 15–752 and students who meet the eligibility requirements established under the national school lunch and 34 35 child nutrition acts (42 United States Code sections 1751 through 1793) 36 for free or reduced-price lunches, or an equivalent measure recognized for 37 participating in the federal free and reduced-price lunch program and 38 other school programs dependent on a poverty measure, including the 39 community eligibility provision for which free and reduced-price lunch 40 data is not available.

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15. "HI" means programs for pupils with hearing impairment.

16. "Homebound" or "hospitalized" means a pupil who is capable of profiting from academic instruction but is unable to attend school due to illness, disease, accident or other health conditions, who has been examined by a competent medical doctor and who is certified by that doctor

1 as being unable to attend regular classes for a period of not less than three school months or a pupil who is capable of profiting from academic 2 instruction but is unable to attend school regularly due to chronic or 3 4 acute health problems, who has been examined by a competent medical doctor 5 and who is certified by that doctor as being unable to attend regular 6 classes for intermittent periods of time totaling three school months during a school year. The medical certification shall state the general 7 8 medical condition, such as illness, disease or chronic health condition, that is the reason that the pupil is unable to attend school. Homebound 9 or hospitalized includes a student who is unable to attend school for a 10 11 period of less than three months due to a pregnancy if a competent medical doctor, after an examination, certifies that the student is unable to 12 13 attend regular classes due to risk to the pregnancy or to the student's 14 health.

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17. "K-3" means kindergarten programs and grades one through three.

16 18. "K-3 reading" means reading programs for pupils in kindergarten 17 programs and grades one, two and three.

18 19. "MD-R, A-R and SID-R" means resource programs for pupils with 19 multiple disabilities, autism and severe intellectual disability.

20. "MD-SC, A-SC and SID-SC" means self-contained programs for 21 pupils with multiple disabilities, autism and severe intellectual 22 disability.

23 21. "MD-SSI" means a program for pupils with multiple disabilities
24 with severe sensory impairment.

25 22. "MOID" means programs for pupils with moderate intellectual 26 disability.

27 23. "OI-R" means a resource program for pupils with orthopedic 28 impairments.

29 24. "OI-SC" means a self-contained program for pupils with 30 orthopedic impairments.

25. "PSD" means preschool programs for children with disabilities
 as provided in section 15-771.

33 26. "P-SD" means programs for children who meet the definition of 34 preschool severe delay as provided in section 15-771.

35 27. "Qualifying tax rate" means the qualifying tax rate specified
 36 in section 15-971 applied to the assessed valuation used for primary
 37 property taxes.

38 28. "Small isolated school district" means a school district that 39 meets all of the following:

40 (a) Has a student count of fewer than six hundred in kindergarten 41 programs and grades one through eight or grades nine through twelve.

42 (b) Contains no school that is fewer than thirty miles by the most
43 reasonable route from another school, or, if road conditions and terrain
44 make the driving slow or hazardous, fifteen miles from another school that

1 teaches one or more of the same grades and is operated by another school 2 district in this state.

3 (c) Is designated as a small isolated school district by the 4 superintendent of public instruction.

5 29. "Small school district" means a school district that meets all 6 of the following:

7 (a) Has a student count of fewer than six hundred in kindergarten 8 programs and grades one through eight or grades nine through twelve.

9 (b) Contains at least one school that is fewer than thirty miles by 10 the most reasonable route from another school that teaches one or more of 11 the same grades and is operated by another school district in this state.

12 (c) Is designated as a small school district by the superintendent 13 of public instruction.

14 30. "Transportation revenue control limit" means the transportation 15 revenue control limit computed as prescribed in section 15-946.

16 31. "Transportation support level" means the support level for 17 pupil transportation operating expenses as provided in section 15-945.

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32. "VI" means programs for pupils with visual impairments.
