A CONCURRENT MEMORIAL

URGING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE DIRECTOR OF THE UNITED STATES ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY TO MOVE ARIZONA FROM ONE EPA REGION TO ANOTHER OR TO MOVE THE REGIONAL OFFICE TO ARIZONA.

1 To the President of the United States of America and the Director of the
2 United States Environmental Protection Agency:

3 Your memorialist respectfully represents:

4 Whereas, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA),
5 the mission of which is to protect human health and the environment, has
6 ten regional offices; and

7 Whereas, each regional office is responsible for the execution of
8 EPA's programs within several states and territories; and

9 Whereas, regional offices allow the EPA to address health and
10 environmental concerns in a specific area of the country across a set of
11 commonalities in that area, including environmental, economic, cultural
12 and other conditions in common; and

13 Whereas, Region 9 includes Arizona, California, Hawaii, Nevada, the
14 Pacific Islands and 148 tribal nations, the regional office for which is
15 in San Francisco; and

16 Whereas, the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) and other
17 public and private stakeholders in the Phoenix-Mesa nonattainment area in
18 this state have experienced challenges in dealing with EPA administrators
19 who are based out of the EPA Region 9 office in San Francisco; and

20 Whereas, these challenges have included the EPA failing to recognize
21 legitimate natural background sources of ozone precursors, such as from
22 native species indigenous to the Southwest, and international transport of
23 ozone and ozone precursors from other countries and states, including
24 California, Mexico and China, which cannot reasonably be controlled and in
25 the case of native plant species, including shade trees, should not be
26 controlled; and

27 Whereas, public and private stakeholders in Arizona have worked
28 diligently over the past two decades to implement over 90 ozone control
29 measures in this region, including robust regional multimodal
30 transportation investments and expanded transit options, yet the
31 stakeholders have continued to face increased scrutiny and unrealistic
32 expectations from the EPA; and

33 Whereas, modeling conducted by MAG has found that, even if this
34 state were to remove all four million on-road vehicle engines in the
35 Greater Phoenix Metropolitan area, this drastic, costly and unrealistic
36 measure would not bring the Phoenix-Mesa nonattainment area into
37 compliance with the 2015 ozone standard under the current design value;
38 and

39 Whereas, leadership at the EPA Region 9 office has not acted on the
40 revised Maricopa County Air Pollution Control Regulations II – Rules 204
41 and 205, which allow parties in the Phoenix-Mesa nonattainment area to
42 earn nontraditional emission reduction credits for implementing reasonable
43 emission precursor control measures on nontraditional sources and mobile
44 sources, such light and heavy duty vehicles, which are the primary source
45 of ozone emission precursors in some nonattainment areas; and

1 Whereas, the EPA Region 9 office is failing to meet the needs of and
2 adequately recognize the circumstances in Arizona. Region 8, which
3 includes Colorado, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, Wyoming and
4 28 tribal nations, is a better fit for the concerns of Arizona.

5 Wherefore your memorialist, the House of Representatives of the State of
6 Arizona, the Senate concurring, prays:

7 1. That the President of the United States and the Director of the
8 United States Environmental Protection Agency do one of the following:

9 (a) Move Arizona from EPA Region 9 to EPA Region 8.

10 (b) Move the EPA Region 9 office from California to Arizona.

11 2. That the Secretary of State of the State of Arizona transmit
12 copies of this Memorial to the President of the United States and the
13 Director of the United States Environmental Protection Agency.
